Prior to the ceremony, Miss Effie Crater, organist, and Miss Dorothy Mae Walker, soloist, presented a program of wedding music.

Vows were exchanged before the altar flanked with Oregon fern and Southern smilax interspersed with floor baskets of white gladioli. The nuptial setting was softly lighted by tapers in seven branched candelabra.
