Sparta Physician Asks Supreme Court To Review Abortion Case

Dr. B. O. Choate, Sparta physician who was sentenced to one to three years in the state prison last September for criminal abortion in the death of Mrs. Annie Mae Anderson, last week filed his appeal with the State Supreme Court.

The request for a review of the case was based on more than 40 exceptions to testimony and to directions of the trial judge.

In passing sentence following the trial in superior court at Dobson last year, Judge William H. Bobbitt said he thought the evidence presented in the case justithought the verdict was "soft."
