Hugh Chatham **Hospital On** Approved List

The Hugh Chatham Memorial Hospital here is one of 3,143 hospitals in the United States and Canada which qualified for approval by the American College of Surgeons in 1947, according to Dr. Irvin Abell, chairman of the board of regents of the A. C. S.

Dr. Abell said the new Approved List shows only a small increase over 1946, but that this is due partly to the omission of some 75 Army hospitals which have ceased to operate.

"It is a satisfaction to state that, in general, the service readered by our hospitals today, despite high costs, shortages of personnel, and other difficulties, is worthy of warm commendation," he declared.

Among requirements hospitals must meet for approval by the American College of Surgeons are modern physical plant, competent administrator, adequate and efficient pertherapeutic facilities, complete medical records and a hmanitarian spirit.
