New Equipment Is Needed To **Carry On Work**

Elkin's Emergency Rescue Squad is issuing its first call for public financial support since voluntary contributions provided an iron lung in 1944.

New equipment is needed at this time to be used in water rescue work. During the summer months the squad receives numerous calls for assistance to those involved in water accidents.

Four water rescues undertaken last summer proved hard on the equipment and several new items of equipment are needed now. This includes boats, motors, grappling irons, rope, and life jackets.

The latest piece of equipment to be added by the rescue squad is a portable lighting plant with a 1,500 watt capacity. This is operated by a generator powered by a gasoline engine and can be set up in any location. This
