RELEASE THREE IN DEATH CASE

Husband, Two Friends Held Until Tuesday For Investigation

DIED OF HEMORRHAGE

Henry Stanley, of near Footville. Yadkin county, and his two neighbors, Jim Burchette, 33, and his brother, Claude Burchett, 35, of Davie county, were released from the Yadkin jail at Yadkinville late Tuesday afternoon following a report that Mrs. Henry Stanley died from natural causes, after they had been held for investigation. An autopsy was performed on the body at Bowman Gray School of Medicine, where it was sent late Monday afternoon by Sheriff Bill Moxley and Coroner Jake Brown.

Mrs. Stanley, about 40, died in an ambulance between her home and Yadkinville about mid-afternoon Monday. According to reports the body was found by neighbors in the yard of her home where it was said to have lain all Surry To Lead N. C. night.
