

Elkin's March of Dimes was in high gear this week, the final one of the drive against poliomyelitis. Charles Utley, co-chairman, reported yesterday that solicitations were fairly-well received but the outcome of the committee's efforts was not definite.

An auction which was to be held Wednesday night at 8:30 at the Reeves Theatre is expected to net several hundred dollars for the campaign. Members of the Junior Woman's Club, along with other groups appointed by the committee, solicited prizes to be sold.
