

Yadkin county in 1947 produced 8,542,000 feet of timber, including 6,517,000 feet of softwood and 2.025,000 feet of hardwood, according to C. Parker Persons, regional director of the United States Department of Commerce in At-

A total of 48 mills of Yadkin county reported in the census. Their production was part of a total of 1,539,656,000 feet of lumber produced by 4,588 mills in the state as a whole, including 1,173,562,000 feet of soft-wood and 366,094,000 feet of hardwood lumber.
