Politics Behind Yadkin Dam Fight Say Authorities

Difference of opinion among engineers is the reason given by authorities at Raleigh for delay in the Yadkin River flood

control and power program. Some engineers think several insist one big dam will do the job more economically. Back of this technical reason, however, is a lot of political maneu-

Congressman Robert L Doughton and Congressman C B. Deane do not see eye to eye on the project. Doughton favors emphasizing flood control with only secondary, if any, consideration for power development. Deane favors utilization of proposed dams for both purposes.

But there is more than that involved. The big dams proposed would inundate a lot of fertile land in Caldwell County, which is in Doughton's district, while almost sole benefits from flood control would accrue to Wilkes, Yadkin and Davie Counties, which are in Deane's district. Each Congressman is properly looking after the interests of his own constituents.


