MISS ROOSEVELT'S EASTERN GIFTS SHOWN

Her Oriental Fans Make Best Collection in Washington Also Fine Pearls

Washington, Dec. 16.—Miss Alice Roosevelt today showed to her friends some of the gifts which she received in the Orient, among them the handsome white satin and pearl inlaid screen, which was one of the Mikado's souvenirs.

She has a fine collection of fans, some very dainty pearl and satin, and others very fancy affairs, intended for decorative purposes. There are nearly fifty of these, and they make one of the best collections of Oriental fans ever seen in this city.

Miss Roosevelt intends to give small gifts to every member of the party which accompanied her and Mr. Longworth, her fiancé, to the Philippines, and they will be selected from these souvenirs. The present which Miss Roosevelt received from the Sultan of Sulu was not a ring, but two very fine and well-matched pearls. These Miss Roosevelt has already given to her fiancé, and will have them made into a ring as a memento of this memorable trip.

It was learned today that the presents, which were reported as worth from \$20,000 to \$100,000 before their arrival in this country, did not come anywhere near even the smaller amount at the appraisal in the custom house. The amount which the President's daughter paid to the customs collector of the port of Georgetown was exactly \$1,200.15.

This appraisal was in rigid conformity with the law, and there was not the least favor shown to the President's daughter. Miss Roosevelt paid the amount herself, from her own income.

One quaint three-legged chair of teakwood is among the larger gifts, and there are some rare pieces of Royal Satsuma, one of them more than 200 years old. The small Roosevelts have been made happy by the gift of a full assortment of Philippine weapons.

GENERAL GRANT CAPERS FOR A REAL PRINCESS

But Titled Miss Is the Princess Contacuzene, His Toddling Grand-daughter and Has the Right to Command Her Warrior Grand Sire.

New York, Dec. 16.—When Brigadier-General Frederick Dent Grant went down the bay yesterday to meet Mrs. Potter Palmer, and his grandchildren, the youthful Prince and Princess Contacuzene, on the White Star line steamship Majestic, the General saw the little Princess Berthe, who is only eighteen months old, for the first time, and gave his entire time while on board the ship to entertaining her.

She toddled contentedly up and down the deck with the General, while her nurse gazed suspiciously at the grandfather from afar. Prince Michael, more dignified, with his five and a half years, walked up and down alone.

Princess Contacuzene, their mother, was Miss Julia Dent Grant. She and her husband have been in Paris, and intend to come to this country in February. It was at the suggestion of Mrs. Potter Palmer, her aunt, that the children were allowed to come over in advance.

General Grant had eyes and ears for no one on board but the children. He patted the little prince on the head and jumped little Berthe up and down. Most of the time while the vessel was coming up the bay, and even after she got into dock, he spent his time caressing about the deck and crying "Dada," and other nonsense which delights the baby world, to the great satisfaction of little Berthe. When she was not toddling up and down she was looking up at her grandfather, rather surprised, but still greatly pleased.

Mrs. Grant met the party at the pier. She was allowed to board the vessel as soon as the gangplank was in place, and before any of the passengers were allowed ashore. The children will stay with their grandparents on Governor's Island.

At the pier General Grant got his attention of the children long enough to say that the prince was a fine little fellow.

"He can speak four languages—French, Russian, German and English," he said. "Yes, he is a mighty fine boy." And then the General again gave his attention to jumping and crying "Dada!"

JOHN D. EKES OUT 1905 ON PALTRY \$40,000,000

Rockefeller Draws \$5,000,000 for Last Standard Oil Dividend.

New York, Dec. 16.—John D. Rockefeller today drew \$5,000,000 as his share of a dividend of \$10 a share declared last month by the Standard Oil Company. This is the last quarterly dividend of the year, and brings the total up to 40 per cent., or \$40,000,000.

Of this, Mr. Rockefeller's share is \$20,000,000. It is estimated that his income from his railway, gas, subsidiary oil companies and other investments will be at least \$20,000,000 more, so that his income for the year, on the most conservative estimates, reaches the enormous total of \$40,000,000.

The year 1905 has been the banner year for the Standard Oil Company so far as earnings are concerned. The disturbances in Russia, which have prevented the normal production of Russian petroleum, have made the demands abroad for the American product larger than ever before. The company has advanced its profits still more by steadily advancing the price of petroleum to the consumers in the United States.

Mrs. M. M. Frazier Is Dead.
Charlotte, Dec. 16.—Mrs. Margaret Montgomery Frazier, wife of Mr. Isaac A. Frazier, aged 70, died at her home in this city yesterday morning. Mrs. Frazier was one of the best-known women of the county. She was a woman of strong character. During the war she managed her husband's business, ran his farm and supported their children.

PITTSBURG DINNER HOT STUFF, SAYS ANNA HELD

Actress Supports Steel King Corey's Statement Regarding Actions of Club Members.

Paris, Dec. 16.—Miss Anna Held is here at her home, 8 Faubourg Honoré.

Her attention was called today to the story that William E. Corey, president of the United States Steel Corporation, had threatened to make revelations involving actions by prominent Pittsburgh men, which took place at a banquet at which Miss Held sang, unless these men ceased criticizing him.

The dinner took place at the exclusive Duquesne Club, Pittsburgh, and it was said that Miss Held, who sang, was roughly treated by some of the diners.
