POLICEMAN R. Y. SKEENS IS SUSPENDED UNTIL HEARING CAN BE HELD

Officer Charged With Being Intoxicated While on Duty Yesterday.

SEVERAL MAY BE WITNESSES

For being drunk while on duty, Policeman R. Y. Skeens was yesterday suspended and deprived of his uniform and officer's equipment, the action being taken by Mayor Murphy, who had evidence that he thought was sufficient to justify him. The suspension was reported to the Board of Aldermen at a meeting yesterday afternoon and an investigation of the case will be made at the next meeting.

Turner, hurried to the scene.
