Taft by the Virginia State Bar Association here to-day on the occasion of the address of the Republican candidate on "the Law's De-lays." The school employs three teachers, two of whom are supported by the county five months in the subscription school follows this for some months. Additional expenses are mat months. Additional expenses are moted by funds coming from a bequests and from appropriations by the North Carolina Yearly Meeting. The mission has been a great factor for good in that neighborhood. Many children, as well as young men and women, have been given the opportunity of an education who would otherwise have grown up without any schooling whatever. The average curollment for the past few years has been from 125 to 150. The committee reported a marked change in the attitude toward strong drink in that neighborhood the past year.
