WASHINGTON, D. C., April 2.—Secretary Teller to-day received from Agent Wilcox at the San Carlos, Arizona, the following telegram dated yesterday:
"The Indians at the agency were greatly excited last night by the reported presence of one or more Chiccahaus on the reservation, at 3 o'clock this morning. Lieutenant Davis with one hun-dred scouts and friendly Indians passed up the San Carlos river thirteen miles to the camp of Nadaski, chief of the White Mountain Indians, where they found a buck named Peach who went out with Locos' band of Chiricahaus on April 19th last. Nadaski and Peach were brought in and the former was tried and ordered to Camp Thomas to be placed in irons with recommendation that he be sent to the Dry Tortugas for life for harboring renegades threatening to burn the agency, kill the employees, go on the war path with the Chiricahuas and for endangering the peace of the reservation. Hoping to obtain information Peach will be held here for three or four days. The Indians here will see to it that he does not escape. All are quiet. Conduct of the Indians last night proves their


