STATE NEWS.

Rockingham Spirit of the South: A petition is in circulation and being numerously signed, praying the county commissioners to have a county bridge erected over Little River at Smith's Ford.

Goldshoro Bulletin: The six year old child of William Griswold, colored, was burned to death in town this week.

The child was subsequently seized with spasms, and at last accounts was alternately writhing in the greatest parental agony, foaming at the mouth, barking and whining like a dog, and manifesting every other symptom of most malignant rabies. Trouble is feared from other dogs which have been bitten.

Captured and Recaptured.

Edinburgh News-Observer, 1st inst. John F. Hawkins is a printer, who years ago worked in Raleigh. Afterward he was at Oxford and Charlotte, with going to the postoffice there and asking for letters belonging to other parties. His offense was that he had tied to the postoffice. He was captured there by special agent Spragens, but escaped from that officer. He came here on Friday, when he was arrested. He is now in custody. The case will be tried next Thursday before U. S. He was then taken to jail, where he now is.

An Unprovoked and Cold-Blooded Murder.

Fortress Monroe, Va., April 3.—A brutal murder occurred about eleven o'clock Saturday night in the bar room of Barnes Hotel, at Hampton, Va. It appears that Thos. Phillips, a quiet, offensive citizen, was passing the hotel on his way home, where he was met by an old acquaintance named P. Joyce, who invited him in to take a drink. Phillips refused to drink, but accepted a cigar, and while standing at the counter of the bar Joyce, without any provocation, suddenly and deliberately shot him through the heart. After shooting him, Joyce placed the pistol in Phillips' pocket and he was taken to jail. Phillips was placed in the National Soldiers' Home. Phillips leaves a wife and three children. The case was entertained yesterday morning that Joyce would be taken from the jail and lynched. An extra guard was placed on duty at the jail last night.

The Mississippi River Again on the Rise.

New Orleans, April 2.—The river rose 3 inches yesterday, and is now one inch below the height attained last year. A special to the Times-Democrat from West Meville says: The Atchafalaya river in the north of Louisiana inches more water is expected here, and probably more in the swamps along the line of the River. The water is now running through the levee and a considerable portion of the track will be washed away between this place and Baton Rouge Junction, a distance of 40 miles, but the water will be a large force of men will soon put the track in repair. The water in Fordere and here is rising each day, and is now running through the levee a mile and a half above the railroad crossing, submerging many small plantations. The levee plantations has only 30 acres above water. The levees on the lower Fordere are all good, with 15 inches above water. The Gros Cote is rising, but the levees are secure.

Hostile Indians Captured.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 2.—Secretary Teller to-day received from Agent Wilcox at the San Carlos, Arizona, the following telegram dated yesterday: "The Indians at the agency were greatly excited last night by the reported presence of one or more Chichasau in the reservation. I ordered this morning, Lieutenant Davis with one hundred scouts and friendly Indians passed over to the camp of Nadaski, chief of the White Mountain Indians, where they found a buck named Peach who went with the Indians to the reservation on April 19th last. Nadaski and Peach were brought in and the former was placed in irons with recommendation that he be sent to the Dry Tortugas for life for harboring renegades, threatening to burn the agency, kill the employees, go on the war path with the Chichasau and for endangering the peace of the reservation. Hoping to obtain information Peach will be held here for three or four days. The Indians here will see to it that he does not escape. All are quiet. Conduct of the Indians last night proves their loyalty."
