Marshal Arnold and four deputies accompanied the receiver and stood by his side while he read the legal decree, which took an hour and a half. At the conclusion of the reading he said: am now authorized to accept bids for this property. The distilleries purchased to-day were the Shufeldt, of Chicago; the Star and Crescent distilleries of Tazewell county, Illinois; the Central of St. Louis; the St. Paul; the Riverdale, of Chicago; the Hamburg, of Tazwell county, Illinois: the Northern, f Peoria; the Manhattan, of Peoria: the Monarch, of Peoria; the Great Western, Wollner and Peoria distilleries, all of Peoria; the White Spring distillery, of Omaha: the Consolidated, of Cincin nati; the Maddux-Hobart, of Hamilton county, Kentucky: the Wabash, of Terre Haute, and Latonia, of Cincin




