THE MORA-SPANISH CLAIM IT IS SETTLED BY COMPROMISE.

Naturalized Citizen of America Gets the Value of His Plantation in Spain, Less Interest- The Administration Would Have Seized the Port of Havana if Spain Had Deferred Settlement Much Longer. Washington, Aug. 20 .- After many will never be taken alive. years of controversy, the claim of Maxima Mora, a naturalized American citizen, against the government of Spain for the value of his sugar plantation in Cuba, has been amicably settled, or rather practically so, for Spain has until September 15th to make the payment. Spain's final and positive agreement to pay at an early date was made some time ago, but since the cabinet council at Madrid committed the government to that promise, a difficulty arose through a further decision of the council not to pay the interest on the claim, amounting to about \$800,000. It was believed at the time that this attitude of the cabinet would result in serious difficulty between the United States and Spain.

The patience of the Washington government has been worn out through Spain's consistent policy of making promises and then failing to keep them. retary Herbert. This was no less than an intention to seize Havana and hold that port until the Spanish government until custom revenues, amounting to the Havana customs house by the United States officers who would be placed in charge.
