The opening prices were a shade firmer than Saturday's closing, but the market gradually declined % per bushel, closing around the lowest point. The bearth features were the continued heavy receipts in the Northwest large primary arrivals and a large increase in the visible supply, 4.28,000 bushels, this latter being the second largest on record, and was the main cause of the weakness, although it had been discounted before that until the final figures were reported. On the other hand, the weather continues dry, and the prediction for to-morrow indicates no relief. The orange and judd farmers were very bullish on the droughs question, but the trade is disinclined to take cognizance of a possibility of crop damage at this season of the year, appearing to lay more stress on receipts and shipments. Clearances amounted to nearly 500 000 bushels, and Liverpool, too, reported a good inquiry for cash wheat. The market is in a stagnant condition, and its future course is hard to predict just now. Coarse grains were lower in sympathy with wheat. Trade was narrow.

The heavy receipts of hogs, 50,000, caused a weak feeling in provisions, and a decline of 12½ in pork and from 5 to 7½ in lard and ribs. A large packing concern led the selling and shorts the buying. Part of the decline was recovered near the close, but the feeling is rather bearish.
