New ORLEANS, La , April 9 .- Secreary Hester's analysis of the movement f the cotton crop by groups of States for the seven months from September 1895, to the close of March, 1896, is sued to-day shows that the entire increase for the month of March over last ear, the 7 550 000 crop year, and over 893, the 866 700,000 crop year, was in the Gulf and Atlantic States, Texas show ing a falling off from the March move nent of all the past three years as the smount brought into sight in March, his year, was larger than that month since 1883, except in the bumper crop-of 1891-92 and 95. 
