Some interesting stories of the Stanley expedition were told the other night. One of these should be very pleasing to total abstainers. The expedition started, it seems, with an allowance of two bottles of brandy per man. These, however, were exhausted in the first two months and for two years the explorers went without any liquor. They got on very well without it, but, "thank heaven," said one of them, "we carried the empty bottles with us. For when we got to Starvation Camp we sold the bottles to the niggers and got more food for them than one of the party got for his whole kit, which cost him \$35."

The exhibition of jewelry which is now being held at the Kunstgewerbe Museum at Berlin is a most interesting show. Prominent among the exhibits are some magnificent sets of ornaments lent by the Empress of Germany. They are all made at Castellani's famous workshop at Rome. The most admired among them is perhaps the necklace presented by the Empress Frederick, which consists of a chain of double chrysanthemum blossoms in gold, the centre of each flower being a very fine small pearl. Fine lotus flowers with pearls pendant from them connect the larger blossoms, each of which has a pendant of a small gold bead of Hero.

Congressman Post showed last night in the tariff debate that he is a true fetish worshiper. As the African savage ascribes to his crooked stick all the good things that happen to him, while charging all misfortunes to something else, so Post Galesburg statesman credits all the prosperity we have had in the United States to our blessed protective tariff, but the depression in business, the enforced idleness, the industrial and commercial stagnation, he attributes to some evil agency which he fails to name.
