NEWS AND COMMENTS.

Numerous Swam and Hopping Clipped From Various Sources.

There are about a thousand elk killed in Oregon and Washington every year. The antlers from most of which are sent to England for ornamentation.

Oscar Wilde refused an invitation to the dinner of the Thirteen Club on the ground that the object of the club, to abolish the superstition, was "really dreadful."

"Old Chabert," one of the best known Socialist speakers in Paris, died recently. He spent his days denouncing capitalists, and always appeared in public wearing a blood-red scarf.

A movement has been started at Middleborough, Ky., to raise subscriptions for the erection on the top of the Cumberland Gap of colossal statues of Generals U. S. Grant and Robert E. Lee.

Miss Eleanor L. Fleury, of London, a recent graduate of the London School of medicine, has a record in three colleges of the highest honors a woman can obtain.

A remarkable run of striped bass is reported from the Susquehanna. At Fort Deposit the fish are said to be so numerous and so large they have broken the nets of several of the fishermen.

London is just now placarded from end to end with immense pictures of Stanley and his men in a group. The pictures are issued by Sampson, Low & Marston, the publishers of Stanley's book.

Theodore Tilton is described by a lady who recently saw him in the new salon in Paris. He has grown stout, and his long, white hair was pushed behind his ears and his face had a restful look peculiar to men of leisure.

On an average there are thirty-five more boys than girls born in New York city every week. On the average fifty-five more males than females die. So the female population grows more rapidly than the male.

The Emperor of Japan wants to ride expensively. Therefore he has ordered that a state coach be constructed and has laid aside \$175,000 for that purpose. Of course the ornamentation is responsible for the most of this sum.

A meerschaum pipe, which was at one time the property of General Law Wallace, is owned by a man in Palatka, Fla. During a successful raid upon his headquarters by Confederate troops during the war this relic was captured.

Governor Gordon, of Georgia, has written a letter indorsing the principles of the Farmers' Alliance. It is possible that General Gordon may succeed Senator Joseph E. Brown in the United States Senate.

A well digger living in Talbotton, Ga., was hired last week to clean out a well. When he came out of the well in the evening it was noticed that his jet black hair had changed its color from black to a bright yellow or golden shade. The cause is unknown.

The French Government is encouraging French physicians to attend the Berlin Medical College, and in order to give proof of its sincerity in this direction four military surgeons of high standing have been ordered to represent the French army at the coming gathering of medical men.

Mr. Irving is going to give a stimulus to Young England's interest in Shakespeare. On June 23 Miss Terry and he will read "Macbeth" in the New Schools at Oxford for the benefit of the Union Decoration Fund. After it may be expected that debates at the Union will be adorned for some time with copious quotations from the Bard. On June 27 Mr. Irving will repeat his Wolferhampton address on "Hamlet" for the edification of the Harrow boys.

A number of Cambridge admirers of Mr. H. M. Stanley have subscribed for a gown for presentation to the gallant explorer on the occasion of the conferment of the honorary degree of LL. D. on June 10. The proposed gift is almost unprecedented at Cambridge, where usually the recipient of the degree has the privilege of not only buying his own robes, but also of paying a considerable fee to the university that confers the degree, as well as to the college that has the honor of receiving him as one of its members.

It is stated that the number of persons killed by the railroads in this country during the year ending June last was 5,823, and the number injured 26,908. During the year the railways of the country carried 472,161,843 passengers, so that one passenger in every 1,533,133 was killed and one passenger in every 220,024 was injured. This shows a much higher percentage of casualty than prevails upon the English railways, where it appears that the rate was one passenger in 6,942,336 killed and one passenger in 527,577 injured.

A performance of "Married Life" was given in London the other day for the benefit of Buckstone's daughter, a number of prominent actors taking part, with only one line to speak. "Oddly enough," says the London Stage, "this most practiced actress was rendered so nervous by the warmth of the reception she received that she stumbled with her single line, announcing 'Miss Kate Phillips' instead of 'Mrs. Dove.' This is not unusual. It is an affliction for actors of high rank to appear in little parts which a super could do better. They nearly always make a mess of it."
