NEWS AND COMMENTS.

Secretary Davis and Representing Clipped from Various Sources.

The Republicans of Texas have just nominated for the Governorship of that great Commonwealth a man who bears the name of Flanagan. Was it this Flanagan who, when a delegate in one of the earlier National Republican Conventions asked: "What are we here for?" replied, "For the office, of course." It so, he seems to have carried his principle to a consummation highly favorable to himself, in the recent Texas Gubernatorial Convention.

The Canadian press, which received the proposition of Senator Sherman providing for reciprocity in the matter of coal, with so much effusion, are now very much downcast on account of the passage of the McKinley bill, which shuts them out from the United States as a market for a number of their products. The latter fact will not only compel the people of Canada to seek other markets but will force the people of the United States to pay higher prices for many things which they buy, which have been appreciably lowered by active competition with the Canadians.

The insurrection that has broken out in one of the cantons of Switzerland has assumed very threatening proportions. The idea has prevailed that the Swiss Confederation was founded upon the liberal principles of administration, and that its Federal system secured its people against the political evils which arise from the centralization of power. There appear, however, to be just grounds for the discontent which has excited the inhabitants of the canton of Ticino to open rebellion and led them to establish a provisional government of their own. This is only another illustration of the fact that not even the citizens of republics are exempt from those disorders that so often disturb the peace and stability of despotic monarchies.

The reports from all the important towns in Virginia is to the effect that the merchants have good reason to anticipate the largest trade this fall that has ever been known in their history. As a further indication of our growing prosperity, the attendance at the Virginia colleges during the approaching session promises to be the most numerous recorded in their annals. The most pressing question is now: How can the students be accommodated? The unusual crowds of visitors at all our leading mountain resorts during the past summer, constituted still another evidence of the increased amount of money of which the people of Virginia as well as of the South are now in possession.—Richmond Times.

The report that Mr. Cleveland intends to leave New York and establish his residence in Massachusetts, originated either in the imagination of some follower of Governor Hill, with whom the wish was farther to the thought, or in the speculative brain of a member of that numerous class of men who are prepared at any moment to sacrifice both probability and veracity to create a sensation that will attract the attention of the public. The people of Massachusetts would no doubt be highly pleased to have in their midst the distinguished ex-President and his charming wife, but New York would throw every obstruction in the way of removal of the illustrious citizen whose career constitutes one of her chief claims to greatness in history.

The attitude which the Charleston News and Courier has assumed towards Captain Tillman is the one which should be imitated by every citizen of South Carolina who was opposed to the nomination of the Alliance leader to the governorship of that State. "There is no appeal," it says in a recent issue, "from the action of the Democratic convention. Captain Tillman is the duly accredited standard-bearer of the party, and he will be the next Governor of South Carolina. The News and Courier will watch his public career with interest. While censuring him where censure is just, and criticizing his words and acts when they deserve to be criticized, it will not withhold from him and his works the approval they shall honestly deserve. His official acts will be squared by his public prominence, and his administration will be judged by itself."
