FRAUD, PERJURY & SMUGGLING.

To obviate the effect of the tariff here, Canada is advised by the London Times to follow the English example and adopt the policy of universal free trade.

The border between Canada and the United States already swarms with smugglers. The interminable boundary line, extending from ocean to ocean, can never be securely guarded, and the McKinley bill defeats its own purposes by its own excesses.

A writer in the London Times says that the Atlantic Coast of the United States seems to have been providentially constructed for smugglers, and trades-people should spend a few months in Central America to acquire excellence in the smuggling art.

The Republican Labor League, organized by machine cunning and machine money some months ago, with Turner and Carleton as immediate beneficiaries under promise to buy labor votes, has also collapsed.

What money is left in the sorely pressed treasury of the machine, is now needed to keep up even betting on Delamater's election, and the machine funds are now drawn on to keep up the betting.

In short, the whole machine is so awfully rattled that confidence alike in friends, in each other and in the cause has fled, and the jarring machine organs are rattling each other and rattling their party in every issue—Phila. Times.
