SENATOR QUAY'S BILL.

The Louisville Courier Journal aptly reviews the current bill of Senator Quay, between the lines of the Constitution of this American government of ours, and it is wholesome reading indeed.

According to this able journal, Senator Quay likes to be thought a man of practical ideas, one who has no nonsense about him. His quiet opposition to the Force Bill and his arrangements before the election, by which the measure was put aside for the Tariff bill, alienated some of his old admirers without gaining him any new friends. He now comes forward with a force bill of his own which he says is the only "practical" way of settling the Southern difficulty.

The chief obstacle in the way of the adoption of Mr. Quay's bill is the Constitution. To the Senator from Pennsylvania this would be no obstacle at all; he is nothing if not "practical," and to him the Constitution is as much of a "barren ideal" as the command "thou shalt not steal." Ordinarily he could count on his fellow Republican members to support him in his contempt of the old instrument, but in this instance the language of prohibition is so plain that any man less "practical" than Mr. Quay will hesitate to defy it. The chief difference between the bill of Senator Quay and the bill of Senator Hoar is in this section:

"When it shall appear to the satisfaction of the President of the United States that in any locality the provisions of this law can not otherwise be executed, it shall be his duty and he is hereby empowered to suspend there the writ of habeas corpus and to employ the armed forces of the United States, naval and military, for its enforcement and for the protection of the officers whose duties are herein provided for."

Turning to the Constitution we find in Section 9, second paragraph, these words: "The privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, unless when in case of rebellion or invasion the public safety may require it."

We do not suppose that either Senator Quay or Senator Hoar will say that we are now threatened with an invasion, or that the Southern States are in rebellion. It is true that there is incipient rebellion in three of the Northern States—Nebraska, Connecticut and New Hampshire—but surely this does not "threaten the public safety," and if it did it would not justify the suspension of the writ of habeas corpus in any other States of the Union. Mr. Quay may be a very astute politician, a very good State Treasurer, and a good schemer for the purchase of votes, but few men are as ignorant as he of the Constitution of the United States.

GERMANY is making preparations to reduce her tariff duties. The Germans move slowly, but they invariably come to the right conclusion at last. For years the peasants of that country have been complaining of the exactions of the tariff, especially upon food importations, and the Government will finally be forced to give relief. Some day every civilized nation will see the shortsightedness of high tariffs and what a bar they are to the universal distribution of food, clothing and all the other necessities of life. His tariffs are not less effective than wars to prevent progress and the diffusion of comfort.

Republicans in Rebellion.

Against the supreme will of the people the Republican party stands in open rebellion. Foreign invaders armed to the teeth could not more threaten the destruction of our free institutions than do the Imperialists with their Fraud and Force Election bill and their revolutionary State proceedings.

Last November a patriotic people, indignant at corruption and abuse in the administration of public affairs, hurled the Republican party from power. The iniquitous tariff, election and financial legislation projected or consummated by the party in power was distinctly and emphatically repudiated. Instead of accepting the verdict with the humility and honesty that should characterize patriotic citizens, the Republicans promptly issued a proclamation of war and organized their forces in rebellion.

President Harrison took the lead in declaring that the people did not know what they were about. Senator Edmunds said that it is no consequence what the people want. Senator Hoar and other rebels are busy throwing up the earthworks of a Fraud and Force Election bill, from behind which, supported by the bayonets of the Army and the cutlasses of the Navy, they can safely march to destroy freedom of suffrage and to enslave the country to their party.

In closely contested States we see the Republican minority following in the path pointed out to them at Washington. New Hampshire, Connecticut, Illinois, Nebraska, Dakota, present the same spectacle of resistance, often by force and always by chicanery, to the will of the people, as declared by their votes. The Imperialists regard the possession of government as theirs by divine right. The freedom of the ballot, the rights of the people, are nothing to them, save as instruments to confirm them in control of public affairs to mercenary ends.

But, despite all things, the plain people will rule in the end. They will not submit to usurpation of their privileges, nor will they tolerate revolutionary tactics. If the Republican leaders were not blind in their desperation they could not fail to read the signs of the times, that point unmistakably to their immediate and complete downfall.—N. Y. Star.

STATE NEWS.

Winston Sentinel: Ten cases disposed of by the Mayor this morning—two for drunkenness, two for breach of the peace, one for carrying concealed weapon and five for nuisance. Fines amounted to \$28.

Wilson Mirror: Mr. Lee Woodard, of Black Creek, a graduate of the University and a young gentleman of culture, will assist the scholarly Prof. Middleton in his admirable Male School in this place.

Raleigh News and Observer: The final dividend due to the depositors of the State National Bank is ready for payment at the Raleigh Savings Bank, and those entitled to it will call on Mr. John T. Pullen for it. The dividend is 3 per cent, and makes a total of 53 per cent, amounting to \$179,908.84. This is the last payment that will be made and is more than it was at first believed that depositors would recover.

Wilmington Star: Messrs. Hansen and Smith, of this place, who are engaged in manufacturing various products from the pine trees at their works at Malmo, ten miles from the city on the W. C. & A. R. R., are making a new product they call "Spirittine Balsam," and which is claimed to be a certain and sure remedy for rheumatism, croup, asthma, sore throat and other ailments where an external remedy is applicable.

Newbern Journal: The truck shipping season has begun. Messrs. Hackburn & Willett are already sending cabbage of the Early Jersey Wakefield and Flat Dutch varieties. A good shipment went off yesterday morning. Peas were being shipped from here last season up to the middle of November. Thus one season comes so near meeting the other that only two months intervene between the cessation and renewal of shipments.
