ETHAN ALLEN AND HIS IRISH FRIENDS.

The life of Ethan Allen by Henry Hall, recently published, is especially interesting for the full and heretofore little known account of his three years' captivity under British jailers by land and sea.

It was not the first nor the last act of kindness that the brave American owed to Irish chivalry, a fact which he gratefully acknowledged in the narrative of his captivity.

The cowardly outrages detailed by him have a familiar sound to Irish ears. Similar indignities and cruelties were perpetrated by the jailers of Michael Davitt, John Boyle O'Reilly and hundreds of other political prisoners in our own time.

Allen and his comrades, thirty-four in number, were cooped up in a pent-house, about 12 by 12 in dimensions, dented all but a meagre allowance of water, and deprived of fresh air and light during the forty days' voyage to England.

The Solebay left Cork on Feb. 12, 1776, for Cape Fear, North Carolina, putting in at Madeira, where Colonel Allen had another experience of Irish generosity.

At Cape Fear the prisoners were transferred to the frigate Mercury, which sailed for Halifax, Nova Scotia. Captain Montague, "being by nature under-witted," was more of a brute even than Captain Symonds.

A case somewhat out of the ordinary was that of the State vs. J. H. Sumner, for assault in the Criminal Court on Thursday, heard by Judge H. Basson Carter.

The prosecuting witness in the case was J. H. Lane, who testified the defendant assaulted him with a rock. In answer to this Mr. Sumner set up a plea of self-defense, that the witness had first assaulted him with a deadly weapon.
