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LELAND STANFORD.

It is said that the late Senator Stanford was a really fine type of the California millionaire, a good man, of large enterprise and of broad and generous views, who tried always to make the best use of his opportunities, both in his public and private relations, and who devoted to works of charity and beneficence a large part of the colossal fortune which his energy amassed.

He was born in the State of New York and began the practice of law there, but went to California in '49 and in "keeping store" and in other dealings with the miners laid the foundations of the great business career which culminated in the construction of the Pacific Railroad. He got early into politics and as Governor of California at the beginning of the civil war rendered important service to the Union, though his part in the great railroad enterprise was perhaps the most important of all. He did not shine especially in the Senate and in late years he took up with some vagaries that threw discredit on his judgment; but California has reason to remember him with admiration and gratitude, and the great university he founded, in memory of his only son, will preserve his name to posterity.

His death will make no political change in the United States Senate, as the vacancy will be filled by appointment of the Governor, who is a Republican, and the Legislature to be elected next fall will choose his regular successor.

DEMOCRATIC ECONOMY.

The New York World's Washington correspondent says:

"Between \$5,000,000 and \$10,000,000 will be left to the credit of the pension appropriation June 30, 1894. This remarkable result is already guaranteed by the reforms begun by Commissioner Lochren and his deputies. The statement here made is no mere guess at the condition of the appropriation at the end of the next fiscal year, but the result of a painstaking examination of the work of the past two years and a careful estimate of the savings that will certainly accrue from the recent orders under which the Bureau is now working. The most gratifying showing, which is now first given to the public, takes into account a deficit of several million dollars left as a legacy by the Raam administration, which will be met by the appropriation of the coming fiscal year."

As the Richmond State well says, this demonstrates that the Democratic party made no idle promises when it asserted that it would prevent further pension steals. If a saving of from five to ten million dollars has been effected this early in the life of the new administration we can look for at least double the amount in another year.

HUMAN nature is a queer thing. A man died in New Jersey last week who was worth \$100,000 and had no near relative. About an hour before he died he asked for a workman who occupied a little house on the place. The physician and nurse surmised that now the

dying Dives was about to give that little home to the workman who had been faithful so many years. "Lasarus," said the dying Dives (that was not the workman's name, however), "you only paid me \$4 on the last rent and in case I die I want to have things straight you know, so I'd like you to pay the other \$2." The money was paid and a few minutes after clutching it Dives breathed his last apparently happy.

The Columbian World's Fair.

The Spanish caravels, reproductions of the vessels with which Columbus made his first transatlantic voyage, followed the track of the great navigator as far as he went, but from that point they have been making a voyage of observation in the New World such as Columbus never dreamed of. From New York harbor, where they headed the great naval review, they sailed to the St. Lawrence and up that stream to Montreal, and they are now on their way through the St. Lawrence canal to Lake Ontario and thence onward to Chicago.

The system of canals by which vessels much larger than those that make their way from the Atlantic to the most remote of the great inland lakes is one of those modern achievements that mark the development of navigation in four hundred years scarcely less striking than the changes in the vessels themselves. It is true that artificial water ways were not unknown to the ancients, but in Columbus' time the seas and rivers afforded more than ample field for the most daring voyager, and the idea of sailing some thousands of miles inland, around rapids and waterfalls, would scarcely have occurred to him even had he supposed that there was any such point to sail to.

It is reasonable, therefore, that the little boats should be made much of at Chicago, when they get there, for few things at the exhibition are more suggestive than they will be of the progress of four hundred years. They will be a central feature of the interesting display upon Lake Michigan, which is itself one of the distinctive features of this World's Fair worth going to Chicago to see.—Phila. Times
