AMERICA AGAINST EUROPE.

England has sent an ultimatum to Nicaragua, giving that Republic seven weeks in which to pay an indemnity of \$75,000 for the alleged wrong done to the British Consul Hatch at the time of his deportation by Nicaraguan troops from Bluefields. England has other claims against the Central American state, which she says may be submitted to an arbitration committee, on which no United States or other American representative shall be allowed to serve. Pending the consideration of these latter, she makes her imperative demand for \$75,000, and backs it up with a threat to occupy Nicaraguan territory as security for its payment. Admiral Jouett, U. S. N., cites as a precedent for England's action that of our own government 1853, when Captain Hollings, of the Cyane, bombarded Greytown, to avenge an insult offered to United States Minister Borland; but he overlooks the fact that England protested against that act and even offered a show of forcible opposition until the guns of the Cyane, trained across the decks of H. B. M. ship Express, persuaded the British captain to consider discretion the better part of valor, and get out of the line of fire. Will England now attempt to bombard Greytown or occupy Bluefields? Not if Admiral Meade be on the spot with one of our new vessels not built for backing down or out.

Germany and France also are reported to be contemplating a demonstration against Venezuela; and Spain is debating whether or not to comply with Secretary Gresham's peremptory demand for apology and reparation on account of the firing, by one of her cruisers, on the United States Mail steamer Allianca on the 8th inst.

Hence arises the newspaper rumor that an European alliance is being formed against the United States; followed by the other rumor that the Latin republics of Mexico, Central and South America, offer to join us in an offensive and defensive alliance against the old world.

Both rumors may be dismissed as doubtful or worse. We have only one enemy in Europe or in the world, and she will not dare occupy Nicaraguan territory or pursue her robbery of Venezuela, once our government says, "Hands off!" France is our traditional friend, so is Russia. Germany has no ground of quarrel with us, outside of a commercial question adjustable on a business basis. No European power can afford to challenge the United States to fight; and even were a new "Holy Alliance" to be formed against us, North and South America could defy the world in arms.

The "Doctrine" of President Monroe was respected when we were a handful of people, and it should be enforced now that we are a mighty nation able to protect our own rights and those of the less powerful Latin republics to the south of us. President Cleveland has shown a firm front towards Spain and England and the whole country will support him in upholding the principle of all America for Americans.

A TSIP TO GOVERNOR McKINLEY.

The Chicago Times-Herald notes the triumphal march of William McKinley through the South, but calls that Statesman's

attention to the melancholy fact that David Bennett Hill was also most generously received, when on a similar march, by the warm-hearted Southerners—and yet failed to get the support of the South on convention day. "The fact must be admitted," adds our contemporary, "that our Southern neighbors are the most accomplished 'jollies' in this republic. Or, to be more friendly if not more accurate, the geniality of their nature is such that when they smile upon a guest and humor his aspirations it is with a distinct mental reservation that the courtesy thus conveyed doesn't 'go' in the more serious business of actual politics. We trust Mr. McKinley will give full weight to this quality of the Southern mind and heart before he finally writes down Georgia and Florida in the McKinley columns."

REVOLUTIONS in Cuba are no new thing. Following the independence of the Spanish colonies in the Americas between 1812 and 1825 Cuba and Porto Rico were saved to Spain only after the most vigorous measures. The attempts of General Lopez in 1848, 1850 and 1851 were the most formidable. Lopez held the rank of major general in the Spanish

army and married a Cuban lady. He was captured in 1851, during his third attempt to free Cuba, and executed. Carlos Manuel Cespedes, a lawyer and planter, began a revolution in 1868, which lasted ten years. It cost Spain \$30,000,000 and 20,000 men the latter mostly by disease, to conquer this revolt. The native Cubans have been tireless during the past seventy years in efforts to overcome the oppression under which they suffer, and the present revolution is but another movement for the independence they seek.
