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## MODERN DEVELOPMENT.

The faculty of Harvard University are being severely criticised for taboing intercollegiate football contests; but there is this excuse to be made for the benighted pedagogues, that they run away with the idea that the first duty of a university is to inculcate learning, mere ordinary scholarship, the thing which produces poets, essayists, scientists and, incidentally, men of serious purpose and lofty endeavor. Harvard managed to raise some eminent men of letters, ere the cultivation of athletics had been dreamed of. She had not astonished the world with any remarkable prodigies since it superceded most other branches.

Athletic sports tend to manliness, say the advocates thereof. There were some pretty many men developed under the old-fashioned system. The names of some scores of them may be found in history. Is not the athletic craze a trifle too crazy? Does it not smack a little of the coarse English system which extols servility, under the name of "fagging," and brutality under the name of "sport"?

The American boy of thirty, forty, fifty, or more years ago, when Farragut entered the navy at the age of nine and a half years, and dozens of others began their sea careers almost as early, was at least as much of a man as the queer creature who runs about the streets, long-haired and bare-legged to day, and thinks he is like one of Charles Kingsley's heroes because he is the superior of a butcher's boy at fisticuff and almost his equal at the spelling-book.

If Harvard has produced a first-rate scholar in the past dozen years, his genius has not been made public, or it has been overshadowed by the greater glory of this or that famous stroke-oar or captain of a team. The faculty have acted wisely in telling the young men to aim at higher things than success in even so good a thing, *per se*, as athletics.

THE *Textile Mercury*, one of the leading textile journals of Great Britain, takes a rather gloomy view of the future of cotton manufacturing in that country. In a recent issue it says: "It is high time the English cotton spinner and manufacturer should look out for suitable fields to which he may emigrate, for it seems to be daily becoming more evident that his day is over in this country." The English mill men should climb into the band wagon and come South, for here is the future seat of the cotton manufacturing industry of the whole world.

EVIDENTLY in the expectation that his statement that American clothing was being sold in England below the prices of corresponding English goods would be challenged. U. S. Consul Meeker, at Bradford, has sent a supplemental report to the State Department giving particulars of the transactions, with names of the firms, prices, &c. He states that one large Bradford firm has sent its traveling men and agents to India, South America, and France with samples of twist Melange flannel, made in New York. They expect to take liberal orders at 25 to 30 cents.

## The Lint, the Seed, and the Oil.

The superior advantages of the cotton mills of the South, even with their present equipments and economies, have been so well demonstrated as to compel universal admission. Northern manufacturers rely solely on their more skilled labor to enable them to retain control over the finer fabrics; and this is a condition that can be easily changed by importation or education.

But there are other advantages, besides those already utilized, of which the mills in the cotton growing regions may easily avail themselves to greatly increase their predominance. Chief among them is the combination of gins and cotton-oil mills with the factories. This would enable the factories to take the cotton in the seed and make a profit from the whole product of the plant, besides saving to planters the expense of pressing and baling. Other large industries thus utilize the whole product of their raw material. The chief slaughtering and packing houses of the west prepare for market the hides, bones, horns and hair of their animals as well as the meat, and derive a profit from all of them. Why should not the cotton manufacturers of the South supplement their industry in a similar manner?

It would be a great convenience to many cotton planters—and especially the small planters—to have within easy reach factories to which they could haul their cotton in the seed and there dispose of both the lint and the seed, saving all the expense and labor of ginning and baling; and the demonstrated advantage of this addition to their industry would stimulate the establishment of cotton factories in many localities now far removed from them. In all probability, factories would seek the locations offering these facilities until eventually there would be few extensive cotton growing regions without a factory or two within easy reach of the planters.

We are glad to note a proposition to have a cotton seed oil mill in operation during our great exposition of next fall. Northern visitors inspecting it will readily see the advantage of such a mill in connection with the cotton factories, and as they cannot possibly have such additions to the factories of their own section, another strong inducement for investment in the South will be presented.—*Atlanta Journal.*

Precinct C, being that portion of the Second ward of said city lying south of said Chestnut street, and an extension thereof westerly and west of William street, and an extension thereof southerly, and the place of voting therein shall be at Bryan's store on James street.

Precinct D, being that portion of said Second ward lying south of said Chestnut street, and an extension thereof easterly, and east of said William street, and an extension thereof southerly, and the place of voting therein shall be at Crook's store.
