Mr. W. H. Collins, secretary and treasurer of the Edowment Rank, Knights of Pythias, recently paid over to Mrs. N. J. Smith \$3,000, the amount of insurance on the life of her deceased husband in the Knights of Pythias.

The large two-story brick building, in the vicinity of Wayne Cotton Mill, to be occupied by the Felt Mattress Factory of Royall & Borden is nearing completion, and the machinery will soon be placed in position.

The new play is a romantic drama in four acts, dealing with the principal love affairs and incidents in the life of the great poet. It is intensely interesting and dramatic, and Mr. Young has mounted it upon a scale of great magnificence. The scenery, which was painted by the late Augustin Daly's scenic artists, and the antique furniture, relating to the period in which

Byron lived, cost Mr. Young \$10,000 before the play was put upon the boards. A car load of scenery and accessories are used in the production, which is said by the critics everywhere to be the most complete and elaborate on the stage to-day.

PHYSICAL EXERCISE ALL IMPORTANT.

Dr. Robert H. Greene has just published a book called "Healthy Exercise," in which he points out the danger of giving up actual work—physical toil—while maintaining an ample diet. This in the maturer years at least loads the system with unnecessary fat at the time it is least able to care for it. Deterioration is the net product.

Physicists are now able to prove that tiring of the old age means as a rule the giving way of the muscular coating of the arteries. When this coating yields down follows, and the skill of man becomes powerless to prevent it. The muscular system, in other words, gives out at a vital point, when the other systems of the human body are in good condition. The maintenance of the muscular system is the real secret of long life.

This can only be done by exercise in the open air—exercise, too, heavy enough to induce a healthy perspiration, which clears the body of impurities. No one who does not sweat daily can be healthy, a vapor bath and the like will not answer, because the effect is too superficial.

Good, hard work each day is what every man needs—work that will change the old and tired tissues of the body for new ones, thus increasing the capacity for brain work. Dr. Greene even considers walking as too mild a form of exercise, unless long maintained. The true rule for the indoor worker seems to be outdoor work to the point of weariness. "In the sweat of thy face shalt thou eat bread," is to be construed literally. Dr. Greene's book should be in the hands of every one whose employment is indoors, for it makes plain the absolute need of genuine physical exercise daily, especially to those of mature age.

AIDEN BENEDICT'S "QUO VADIS."

"Quo Vadis," the masterpiece of Henry Sienkiewicz, dramatized by Chas. W. Chase, will be produced at the Messenger Opera House in this city on Tuesday evening of next week, March 13th.

Aiden Benedict has spent a vast amount of money on the production, the scenery and costumes being not only historically correct, but also beautiful and appropriate. The company is said to be a most excellent one throughout, and without a poor or ordinary actor in it.
