FREMONT RALLY.

Turner and Patterson Speak to a Large Audience
The Democracy of Fremont, the birthplace of Hon. C. B. Aycock, and the home of his popular brother State Senator Benj. F. Aycock, had a gala time last night and did themselves proud in the grand ovation extended to Hon. W. D. Turner, candidate for Lt. Governor and Mr. S. L. Patterson, Commissioner of Agriculture.

Goldboro, too, was well represented at the Rally, and the Goldboro K. of P. concert band furnished the music for the occasion and delight to themselves and their town.

The whole of Fremont and the country round about, ladies and men alike were out in full force, and the audience, in consequence, was simply immense, and the zest with which they appreciated the excellent speaking was indicated on every countenance and by round after round of generous applause.

The speaking was in the large and brilliantly lighted auditorium of the splendid Fremont High School, and on the spacious rose-trium were seated a number of prominent citizens of the town and section and from adistance.

The first speaker was Mr. S. L. Patterson, candidate for Commissioner of Agriculture. He was introduced by Mr. Jos. E. Robinson, editor of the Goldboro Argus, and his speech was a practical presentation of what the Democratic party had done and was doing and offering to do for the farming interests of the State. He did not essay to make a set speech, but his talk was earnest and the facts he presented for Democracy and the Amendment were convincing, and his appeal to the white manhood of his audience was irresistible.

Mr. Patterson stands before the people in himself the embodiment of an honest, earnest, intelligent, progressive representative of the farming element of North Carolina, and that of itself makes him a vote-winner wherever he goes.

Hon. W. D. Turner was introduced by Hon. B. F. Aycock in fervid terms of personal appreciation and the candidate for Lt. Governor was received with great applause. He made a truly magnificent speech. In fact, it was the clearest, simplest, most convincing and persuasive presentation of the amendment we have yet heard; while his review of the records of the two political parties, and his contrasting of existing conditions under their respective regimens in the State was such as to cause every white man who heard him to exist under the white supremacy banner and become not only a voter but a worker for the amendment. It was a great speech. It strengthened the faithful and converted the doubting.

At the close of his speech he was presented on behalf of the ladies of Fremont with a beautiful bouquet of flowers, the presentation being made with characteristic gracefulness by Cal. A. C. Davis, of this city.

Hon. B. F. Aycock then pronounced an old-fashioned Democratic benediction and the great audience dispersed.
