NOMINATION OF GOV. BECKHAM.

The nomination of Acting Governor Beckham for the remainder of the four year term of Governor Goebel was not unexpected. Some opposition to the young leader had been developed but as his course during the trying times that followed Mr. Taylor's inauguration was on trial, his nomination by acclamation logically followed. Although he is young in appearance and in fact, being only 30 years old, he has had not a little experience in public affairs. His three terms in the Legislature, and his nomination for Lieutenant Governor after a thorough canvass of the State, besides his service of nearly a year in or near the executive office during the most critical period in the entire history of the state, really go to make him something more than a tyro in politics and public business. His judgment and courage have never been deficient, and the people of Kentucky judge him worthy of confidence in high office. Beyond all doubt the decision of the convention will become the decision of the state. This is rendered doubly sure by the platform. It condemns the Goebel law, and it demands its amendment "so that the most

In the face of the declarations of the Kentucky Democracy such charges will fall to the ground. The Goebel law will be amended to the satisfaction of all, and Kentucky's name will be found this fall up in its old place in the Democratic column.
