THE ELECTION.

It is a Phenomenal Victory.

The latest election news from the State at large is that the Democratic majority for Aycock and the Amendment is, in round figures, 59,553.

The Senate branch of the General Assembly will be 36 certain and untrifled Democrats: 10 Fusionists, and four who are uncertain.

There will be only two Populists in the lower House, and they are from Sampson county. Of course there will be some Republican representatives—but only two "lonesome Pops."

Mecklenburg, Edgecombe and Robeson are the banner counties, so far as the vote on constitutional amendment is concerned. Each gave it 3,500 majority; New Hanover ranking second with 3,410.

As to Wayne county, she has done nobly. The canvassing board is now in session, but it will be some day next week before we can get the full vote tabulated. We give the full vote on the Amendment, which is about as the general result on the whole ticket will be:
