The Board of County Commissioners did not complete their session on Monday and adjourned to meet again on the 14th, when the question of cotton weathers will come for a hearing as well as other important business.

Mr. Geo. W. Baker, of the firm of Baker & Eason to-day purchased of Mr. M. Sherman the large stables and vacant land on Oak street and will erect at an early date three handsome cottages thereon. This deal with several others was made through the real estate agency of Mr. E. L. Edmundson.

The Grand Encampment of Odd Fellows meets next Wednesday at Wilmington. It will elect a delegate to the Sovereign Grand Lodge, which meets at Richmond, August 17. Many North Carolina members of the order will attend the Sovereign Grand Lodge. There are now 115 lodges in this State, with 6,400 members.

The First Baptist Sunday School will have their annual picnic at Daniel's chapel to-morrow. The little folks are requested to be at the Baptist church at 7:30 o'clock a. m. THE RIGHT TIME.

Goldsboro can offer positive proof of her faith in Goldsboro as a manufacturing centre by pointing to the factories right here in our midst. More than that, every one of those factories was built with home money. This fact alone could be used as a powerful factor in inducing foreign capital to come to Goldsboro.

Now is the time to look after this important matter. The danger of negro rule and bad laws has unquestionably been of great damage to North Carolina, because capital is always sensitive, and capitalists will not invest their money where there is a possibility that bad legislation will be enacted, and lawlessness will abound.

Until last week these dangers threatened North Carolina, but the glorious sun of white supremacy has burst forth in all of its beauty and splendor and power, and the future of the Old North State is bright with hope and promise.

The eyes of the entire country have been upon North Carolina. We have found ourselves equal to the emergency. The great white manhood of the State have secured permanent good government for North Carolina. Capital will no longer fear to come within our borders.

BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

The Board of Aldermen met last night in regular session with Mayor Peterson in the chair, and with Aldermen Hollowell, Hill, Creech, Powell, Draper, Lamb, Sugg and Dewey present.

City Clerk Broadhurst read the minutes of previous sessions held during the month, which were adopted without change.

An ordinance was adopted placing the inspection of plumbing and sewerage connections in the hands of the city and charging a small fee for each inspection.

Alderman Dewey moved that the same tax be imposed upon the merchants this year as was in force last year. The same rate of taxation will prevail this year as last.

The Mayor was instructed to employ some one to take a list of surface water closets in the city for which a tax is imposed. The tax will remain the same as last year, which is fifty cents per head.

Alderman Powell made complaint about the hacks standing at the corner of Walnut and East Centre streets, but no action was taken.

The question of increased taxes for hacks was referred to the ordinance committee.

The city decided to furnish the pipe for a flowing well, which Mr. M. B. Farmer proposes to drive on Walnut street near the big ditch.

Goldsboro Junior Reel Team was supplied with equipments by the board and are now prepared to fight fire.
