Fremont Items.

Mrs. B. F. Aycock is spending this week visiting friends and relatives in and Wilson vicinity.

A fine shower Tuesday evening enlivened things greatly. This immediate section has had more rain than some others.

The Hon. J. M. Wood came in on the noon train Monday and returned on the three o'clock train. He brought four students to school.

On the 10th of next month Fremont votes on a proposition to give the Great Eastern five thousand dollars. There has been very little discussion of the subject.

Miss Robena Atkinson, of Selma, came in on Saturday to take charge of her department in Fremont Academy and Commercial School. Miss Pugh, the music teacher, arrived Monday. Prof. Porter spent the summer here. These teachers have all made a very favorable impression.

The Bank of Fremont opens its doors for business next Monday. The prospects for the successful operation of this institution are very good. J. T. Hooks, as President; Geo. D. Best, as Vice president; and Cutlar Lee, as Cashier, are a trio that have both push and balance. Their connection with it insures success.

Senator elect, B. F. Aycock, has put on his "every-day clothes", and gone to the farm, that ranch, or township, of his down on Nabunta. Being a practical farmer himself, he may very properly be considered a representative of the farmers. But B. F. Aycock is bigger than any sect or caste, and will represent the people of this senatorial district.

The grading of the Great Northern, notwithstanding the intense heat, goes steadily on. The large fill on M. T. Johnson's place is expected to be completed this week, after which progress will seem much more rapid. It takes a great deal of time to start a work of this sort. With all his "vim" the contractor, Mr. Ooon, was able on Tuesday of this week to get all his teams to work at once for the first time.

The people of Fremont are throwing up their hats and hurrahing over the fine opening of the school, on the 27th. This is the beginning of the third year under Prof. Morgan's charge. The first year he had a fairly good school. The second increased 40 per cent. over the first, and now the third has opened more than 50 per cent. better than the second, in numbers. This success is due to the undivided support of the community and to the general belief that very good work is being done in the school. A well equipped Commercial Department just added this year is proving quite an attraction, while an unusually large per cent. of the students are taking the full literary course.

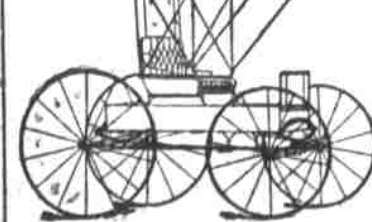
