The Board of Aldermen will meet tomorrow night.

This is the hottest wave the whole country over on record.

The district M. E. parsonage has been equipped with a phone. Its exchange number is 123.

The two banks of the city will observe holiday to-morrow, and the post office will keep Sunday hours.

The railroad freight depots of this city, will be closed on Thursday, in observation of July 4, a national holiday.

Miss Mary Williams, trained nurse, has returned to the city, and is stopping with Mr. and Mrs. Fred Parker.

Mrs. W. D. Wiggins and little son Wilmot, who have been visiting relatives in Savannah, returned home yesterday.

Mr. Hugh Humphrey received a renewal to-day of his appointment as U. S. Commissioner for four years from the Republican administration.

There will be quarterly meeting at Providence church on Saturday and Sunday next. Rev. Dr. F. D. Swindell, presiding elder, will be in attendance.

For the usual offense a negro was lynched in Johnston county last night, about four miles from Smithfield. His name was Jim Baily, and his victim was a 12 year old white girl.

In addition to the other attractions at Seven Springs to-morrow will be a match game of baseball between the Mt. Olive and Parks teams. Both teams are said to be in good condition and the public may expect to see a good game.

Capt. J. W. Lamb's large wagon will be in front of the Hotel Kennon to-morrow morning at 7:30 o'clock sharp to carry passengers to the steamer wharf at old Waynesboro for the Seven Springs excursion, which leaves at 8 o'clock.

Mrs. Geo. C. Royall and two little sons, and Mrs. J. M. Jones and daughters, Misses Alice and Mary, have taken a cottage at Bowman's Bluff, in the western part of the State, where they will spend the summer.

A white tramp passed off a counterfeit half dollar in this city to-day, and hardly had he left the store before the lady clerk, with the spurious coin still in her hand, discovered the "queer" and sent a small boy after him, but he made good his escape.

The steamboat Goldsboro has been temporarily transformed from a freight to a passenger boat in order to make the trip to Seven Springs to-morrow with comfort to the passengers. The lower deck will be fitted with chairs to seat the passengers, while the upper deck will be left open for the benefit of those who may wish to promenade and take in the scenery. Railings have been placed around both decks. The boat will leave at 8 o'clock sharp. Tickets are on sale at the Golds-

boro Drug Co., until 150 have been sold, which is the limit that can be accommodated.

Mr. J. E. Latham, of Newbern, a Wayne county boy, who has many friends in this city and section, was taken critically ill with fever in Washington, N. C., several days ago, and was thence removed to Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore. We all wish for him a safe recovery.

On the 2nd of this month Messrs. Lane & Roberts, of Faro, sent to this office the first cotton bloom that had been seen in that section. It came from the lands of Mr. J. W. Lane, cultivated by Stover Yelverton, a colored man, who has a large crop which is in splendid condition, and who stands high in the estimation of his landlord.

Mr. Harry Lee McCall, the very popular young gentleman who has so long filled a position in the dry goods department of Messrs. H. Weil & Bros., has resigned his position with that firm and left last night for Lexington, where he goes to study the cotton mill business, which he proposes to make his permanent occupation.

The death of Mr. R. E. Lee occurred at his home in Mt. Olive this morning of spinal trouble, from which he had been suffering for the past six years. He was 34 years of age and leaves an aged mother and two brothers, Messrs. J. W. and Walter Lee, two sisters Mrs. Dr. J. W. Kornegay and Mrs. D. R. Perry, together with a number of friends to mourn his untimely demise. The funeral will be held from the Methodist church, of which he was a member, to-morrow afternoon at 4 o'clock and the interment will be made in the cemetery at Mt. Olive.

## EMERGENCY HOSPITAL.

Report of Executive Committee.  
 The Executive Committee of the Emergency Hospital met in the reception room of the Hospital, at 9 a. m. July 1st, Members present, Mesdames Sol Weil, E. B. Borden, S. S. Spier, Thos. Edmundson, H. L. Grant, and Mr. J. Rosenthal and Rev. F. W. Farries.

Minutes of last meeting were read and approved. Mr. Rosenthal on account of a previous engagement was excused. Mrs. Grant was appointed Secretary pro tem. The chairman reported that 9 patients had been admitted during the month, and received treatment in the aggregate for 84 days. Physicians had visited the patients daily, and at times twice a day, and had treated a number of outdoor patients. He also reported that \$35.00 had been received from pay patients since last meeting.

It was resolved that pay patients will hereafter be required to pay weekly in advance, and that physicians and the matrons be notified of this rule. When the patient is discharged before the week expires the proportionate amount will be refunded. It was also resolved to instruct the matron to exclude all company not required for the care of the patients.

Mrs. Sol Weil was instructed to complete arrangements for the white washing and cleaning of the Colored Hospital.

The Secretary was instructed to convey the thanks of the Committee to Mrs. Dr. Sallie Borden Hutton for the generous donation of her medicine cases surgical instruments and medicines to the Hospital.

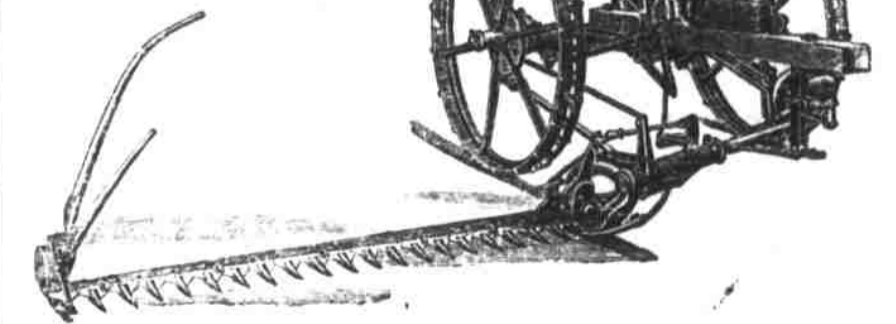
