Let every citizen of Goldsboro turn out Friday to celebrate "Park Day."

Tomorrow is the last of October, and is known in the church world as "Hallowe'en."

Mr. George Hood, of Dunn, is in the city on a visit to his nephew Mayor Geo. E. Hood.

Have you registered? A new registration has been ordered and it is therefore necessary for every one to register in order to vote.

Dr. Geo. J. Robinson, of Smithfield, came down to the city this morning, on a visit to his mother and returned this afternoon. He is quite well, and his many friends here were glad to see him.

The trial of Mr. Will Cotton for using a knife on Mr. James Watson on circus day, was held before Mayor Hood this morning, but Watson did not show up as he was notified to do yesterday. The Mayor placed Cotton under a \$100 bond for his appearance at court.

Day after to-morrow the game law expires and quail hunting will begin. This is one of the most exciting sports this section of the country affords and already local hunters are priming their guns for the sport. The restaurant will then advertise "quail on toast," which is one of the delicacies of the winter season and is relished by everybody.

Mr. Elias W. C. has surprised his friends by riding down town in a brand new pony phaeton, which is by far the handsomest and most stylish turnout seen on the streets in quite a while. The vehicle was built to order by the R. E. Jones Buggy Co., and is lavishly upholstered and artistically decorated. It is a model of workmanship and beauty.

The family accompanied the remains this morning to Warrington, where the interment will be made in the family plot of this cemetery of that town.

Ever and anon the question of a Union Depot comes to the surface. Our Water correspondents suggest that we use the largest shed which Capt. Lamb began to erect as a horse stable. This would be preferable to the present arrangement, if it is true, but we are bringing something better. As soon as the city bonds for public improvements the railroad will see that we have in earnest about reforms and will give us the depot we so much desire and need.

Cotton crop estimators are still a million bales apart, the bears insisting that the crop will be fully 11,000,000 bales, while the bulls say it will not exceed 10,000,000 bales. Thus far the crop in sight is about 300,000 bales below that of last year. Mr. Boston, the Liverpool crop authority, now puts the American crop at 10,750,000 bales minimum, with possible additions on account of a late killing frost, but Liverpool has ceased to pay much attention to crop experts who are rarely prophets.

PARK DAY.

Every Detail Is Now Arranged For the Celebration.

The Committee of Arrangements have completed the following order of march for the Park Day celebration on Friday afternoon, and will publish the program in to-morrow's ARGUS:

At 2 p. m., the Military, Fire Companies, Fraternal Orders, K. of P. Band and citizens will assemble on East Centre street, in front of Hotel Kennon, and from there will proceed to the Park in the following order:

- Mayor and Board of Aldermen in carriages;
- Goldsboro Rifles, Co. D, under command of Capt. H. B. Parker;
- K. of P. Cornet Band;
- Goldsboro Fire Co. No. 1 and all their equipment;
- Fraternal orders;
- Eclipse Steam Fire Engine Company and all their equipment;
- Goldsboro Rifles, Co. B, under command of Lt. E. H. Loftin;
- Goldsboro Graded School children;
- Children of I. O. O. F. Orphan Home;
- Citizens on foot;
- Citizens in carriages.

ORDER OF MARCH.

Down Walnut to John, up John to Oak, down Oak to Graded School, where children and faculty will join procession; thence down William street to Vine street, thence to the Park, where the programme of the celebration will be observed, as published to-morrow.

GOOD ROADS IN THE SOUTH.

The National Good Roads Association, aided by the United States Department of Agriculture and the Southern Railway, have organized a Good Roads special train, and that train is stopping at various places for the purpose of building pieces of good roads, holding meetings, and educating the people.

Town and country throughout the State are alike interested in the building of good roads. The towns prosper where there are good roads, and lands in the country are enhanced in value by them. They are, in short, the best investment a community can make. They mean not only more business and higher values, but they lead to more schools, more church going, more society and more intelligence.

The excellent object lesson furnished by the Southern Railway should be studied by every citizen near whom it is brought. No new-fangled experiments are presented. Only well tested methods will be explained and inculcated. All who have not studied the subject should at any rate attend the meetings that will be held throughout the State at central points in connection with "the Good Roads special."

No doubt it will be money in the treasury of the Southern Railway to secure good roads in the territory it traverses, but such money can only come through the increased prosperity of the people it serves. Such a business is laudable. Such self-seeking is desirable. We need more of that sort. Let this effort of the Southern Railway be utilized to the fullest possible extent. Goldsboro should invite this "Good Roads Special" to come here. Wayne county needs better roads and what benefits this county benefits Goldsboro.
