The object of the fair is to raise money to add to the building fund which the Pythians are raising to erect a handsome building on their vacant lot adjoining the Opera House.

There has been no slackening of interest or attendance at the Pythian Fair. A large crowd was present again last night to indulge in the amusements and buy themselves rich.

The military was out in full uniform, including Col. T. H. Bain, Col. Jos. F. Robinson and Maj. W. H. Smith.

By some oversight the Agents inadvertently stated that tickets to the banquet would be sold for 50 cents to-night. A glance at the bill of fare is enough to show that this could not be done and that 75 cents is really a low price for tickets.

Fair tickets will be sold at the door at the regular price, six for a half dollar. A general admission of 10 cents will be charged all those who do not hold tickets.

Top night will be children's night at the fair and all children under fifteen years of age will be admitted either by ticket or free of charge. To-night the amusement will be a place confetti on snow, as well as a number of other games, such as toy balloons and other novelties for children which have not been sold here before.

### ANOTHER COLLISION

Bay Ridge Train Collides With Empty Cars and Two Are Killed Instantly.

New York, Nov. 19.—As the result of a rear-end collision to-day between a Bay Ridge train, containing about a hundred passengers and a train of five empty cars, both of which were bound for the Brooklyn Bridge on the Fifth Avenue branch of the Brooklyn Elevated Railroad, two men were killed, one was fatally hurt and a number of others received severe injuries.

The accident was due to the Bay Ridge train running into the empty cars. Immediately after the crash, two cars of each train caught fire from the electric connections on the "L" structure. Many passengers on the Bay Ridge train were panicked and made frantic attempts to escape from the cars. Some of them jumped to the streets and received injuries.

The bodies of the motorman and conductor of the Bay Ridge train were found in the first car. Both had been burned to a crisp.

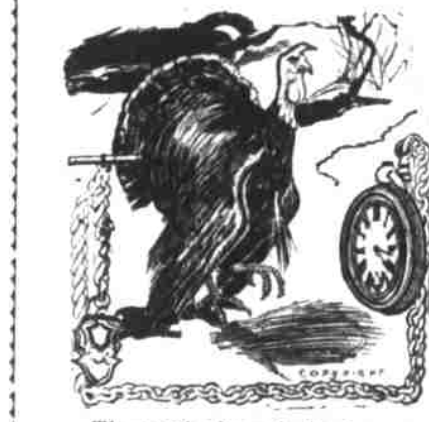
