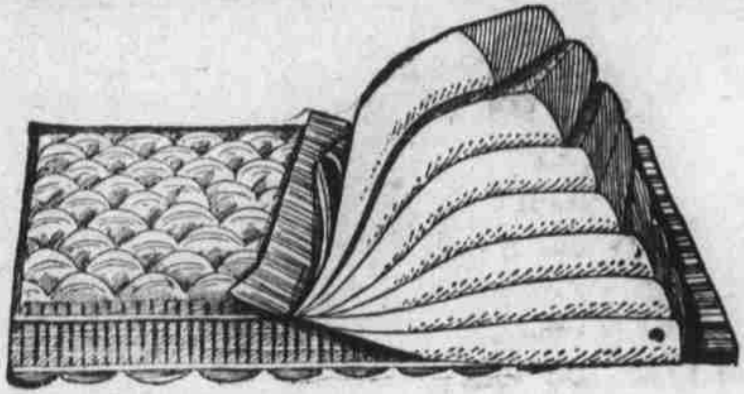

## GEN. RUCKER CELEBRATED HIS NINETY-FIRST BIRTHDAY TODAY

Oldest Retired Officer of the United States Army—An Active Career in Many Wars.

Washington, D. C., April 28.—Brigadier-General Daniel H. Rucker, the oldest retired officer of the United States army, was born in Belleville, N. J., April 28, 1812. In 1837 he entered the army as a second lieutenant of dragoons, and ten years later he reached the grade of captain. In his early military career he saw much service in warfare with the Indians in the West and Southwest. He served through the Mexican war, commanding a squadron at the battle of Buena Vista. His active career likewise covered the period of the Civil war; he was brevetted major-general of volunteers until 1882, in which year he was retired for age. General Rucker was the father-in-law of Gen. Philip H. Sheridan. Since his retirement he has resided in Washington, D. C.

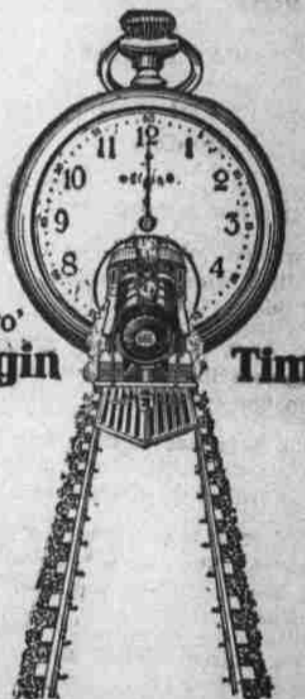
