THE NEXT CENSUS.

The House of Representatives on Thursday passed a bill appropriating \$10,000,000 for the taking of the census of 1910. No doubt the Senate will concur, and a conflict between the two houses will in that way be avoided.

The chances are now that the next census will be taken under an old act, which does not recognize civil service examinations at all. The two houses cannot come to an agreement, and the passage of an appropriation bill is a simple probably means that the two houses have agreed to disagree.

After all, it cannot be said that the cumbersome civil service regulations fit the case. The appointment of a temporary force cannot be conducted in that manner simply because men and women will not get ready for a civil service examination merely to hold an office for the brief term. The methods of former census years are not perfect, but nothing in the official service is perfect. The present census director is an experienced man and can be trusted to select a competent temporary force. This seems to be the outcome of the entire matter. It was precipitated by a veto from President Roosevelt, and in the end no doubt the temporary patronage will be distributed among the states according to population.

On Monday last the Mauretania succeeded in going from the New World to the Old World in four days, seventeen hours and twenty-one minutes. This is a new record in the direction of the Old World, but the Lusitania still holds the record of the quickest westward voyage—four days, fifteen hours, made August 16 to 20, 1908.

Transatlantic steamship records may be said to have begun in 1840, when the Britannia crossed the sea in fourteen days. She was but 207 feet long, whereas the Lusitania of today is 760 feet long. The horsepower of the Britannia was but 740—that of the Lusitania is 68,900! The following table shows the successive reductions in New York to Queenstown records in recent years:

The growth of liners, both in length and horsepower, is remarkable. In 1848 the average length of the twenty longest steamships was 230 feet; in 1851 it was 460 feet; in 1903 it was 440 feet. Today there are eleven vessels of 700 feet or over and two White Star liners building which are to be 850 feet long. Once the Great Eastern, built in 1858, was considered the leviathan of the seas, and yet she was but 680 feet long and her horsepower was far inferior to modern ships.

Speed in the boiling seas calls for horsepower as well as displacement. The recent trip westward of the Mauretania was done at an average speed of 30 1-4 statute miles an hour. A nautical mile is 6,080 feet, and a statute mile is but 5,280 feet. A speed of twenty-five knots an hour means the expenditure of millions in building ships with greater displacement and vastly greater horsepower.

Teachers' Examination.

Examinations for certificates to teach in the public schools will be held in the Court House at Goldsboro, July 8 and 9, by the county superintendent of public schools.

Examinations will be given for the following certificates: State High School Certificate, Five-Year State Certificate, County Certificate.

Examination for A. & M. College.

Applicants for admission to the Agricultural and Mechanical College at Raleigh will be examined by the county superintendent of schools in his office at Goldsboro on Thursday, July 8 at ten o'clock. By standing these examinations young men may save the expense of a trip to Raleigh. The A. & M. College offers 120 scholarships to bright, needy boys desiring industrial education. There are courses of instruction in agriculture, textile and engineering (civil, electrical, mechanical, chemical and mining).
