SENSIBLE RAILROADS.

In announcing that they will handle material for road building in Virginia and only charge therefor the actual cost to themselves, the Virginia railroads are not only patriotic but polite. The Baltimore Sun hits the nail on the head when it says:

"The policy of the Virginia roads is the wise policy and shows that the managers of those corporations are alive to their own interests. For it is certain that no interests are more vitally concerned in good wagon roads leading to their stations and traversing generally the territory served by the railroads than the railroads themselves.

"Nothing stimulates agricultural production more surely than good roads. They invite population and promote railroad travel. They convert a dead country where there is no production and no activity into a live country which produces freight for the railroads and invites visitors who use the railroads. A railroad which traverses a country where the roads are impassable during certain months gets no freight at the way stations in that country in those months, and but few passengers. Therefore in pursuing this liberal policy toward public highway improvement in Virginia the railroad companies are promoting and serving their own best interests."

If the railroads of this section would follow the above admirable lead the influence would be marvelous in results.

OFF YEAR ELECTIONS.

Ohio and Iowa no longer hold elections in the "off year," and Pennsylvania is about to follow suit. The movement to avoid off year elections has become so general that few elections will indeed be held this year. Massachusetts and Rhode Island elect governors and other state officials every year. These states are old fashioned, believing in an annual appeal to the people. Maryland will this year elect a controller, a legislature and vote upon a suffrage amendment. Virginia will elect a governor, other state officers and a legislature. Nebraska elects minor state officials. New York elects the members of the lower house of the legislature, and New Jersey elects a lower house and one-third of the upper house. Pennsylvania will elect judges and minor state officers, and Kentucky a legislature. That is all. There is small opportunity for contests in these elections. No doubt the income tax amendment will become an issue in Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Virginia, Maryland, Kentucky, New York and New Jersey, but nothing decisive is expected from these elections. The chief issue in New York relates to the primary system. The elections of this year will, as a rule, be tame and uninteresting, but next year a new Federal House of Representatives is to be elected and warm contests will take place in all of the states. The warmest will be in the districts represented by insurgents.

CALIBRE OF COOK AND PEARY.

The American people are proud of the achievements of two of their fellow countrymen in having reached the apex of the world, and are prepared to greet them, on their return home, with an enthusiasm commensurate with the importance of their work in solving one of the greatest mysteries of the ages.

But it is unfortunate that the second of these explorers should have precipitated a controversy, even before he reaches civilization, much less before he has placed himself in possession of the data upon which Dr. Cook relies to substantiate his claims of discovery.

There is no doubt in the minds of many scientific men who are entitled to speak with authority that both Dr. Cook and Commander Peary have reached the pole. It is accepted as entirely certain that the man who has brought about the controversy has accomplished what he claims to have done, but if there is any one thing which could cast doubt and discredit upon him it is the hostile spirit he has shown upon being informed that a rival had already carried off the first honors.

There can be no possible doubt that Dr. Cook has shown the better spirit of the two. When informed that Commander Peary had returned with the announcement that he had reached the pole, the Brooklyn physician said he was first to shout "Hurrah," and he added that if Peary claimed to have been to the pole, he had been there.

There was no touch of petty jealousy or detraction.

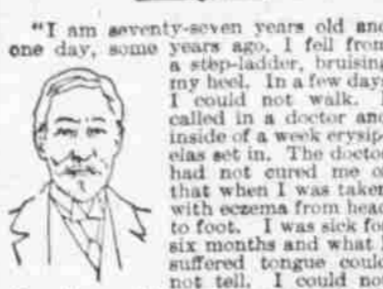
And yet, on the other hand, as soon as Peary is informed of Cook's achievement, he tells the world not to "take Cook too seriously," at the same time quoting those much-discussed Esquimaux as having said that Cook really went but a little way north.

The natural disposition of the scientific world, the personal friends of the explorers and of the American people in general is to give full credit to both men, but Peary's petty jealousy is doing much to discredit his own claims.

GRADED SCHOOL NOTICE.

Those children who have not been successfully vaccinated cannot be admitted to school until they have been, unless they present a physician's certificate that they are immune from small pox.

Beginners will be admitted at the beginning of the fall term, Tuesday, September 14, at the beginning of the spring term in January, and at no other times. The law prescribes that children must be six years old to enter school. If a child shall become six years old within September or October, then that child may be admitted September 14. If it become six years old after October and before March, it may be admitted in the January class.

Let all other children be present Monday, September 13, for promotion or assignment to rooms.
