Mrs. Walter Borden's Beautiful Hymn Sung by Miss Brinson Last Night.

### RAILROAD OFFICIALS HERE.

Atlantic Coast Line Magnates Meet With Aldermanic and Citizens Committee Today.

The special committee having in charge the matter of regulating the shifting of trains through the city and the standing of box cars on the tracks along East Centre street had a conference this morning with Mr. W. N. Royall, general superintendent of the Atlantic Coast Line, and Mr. W. H. Newell, division superintendent, looking to a basis of mutual agreement, and Mr. Royall will report his conclusions at an early day in writing, which the committee hopes will be in keeping with their outlined plans for subserving the best business interests of Goldsboro as a market town for all this section of country.

There was some variance of opinion between the committee and the above officials; but it is to be hoped the latter, when they come to draft their final conclusions, will recognize that the committee have canvassed the situation thoroughly and have maturely formulated their request for the relief outlined.

### FIRE THREATENS YOUNGSTOWN.

Three Suburbs of Youngstown Suffer From Forest Fires.

Youngstown, O., Oct. 11.—Forest fires threatened the destruction of three suburbs of this city today. The most serious blaze was in East Youngstown, where the homes of Joseph Copp, John D. Luck, McLaughlin's meat shop, and Kauman's grocery store were destroyed.

In the southern suburb, known as Boardman, a field fire was raging that threatened hundreds of houses and destroyed a number of small buildings. Science Hill, another nearby settlement, was saved from serious damage by bucket brigades.
