BACK TO THE SOIL.

Al. G. Field was not a great artist, though this is not to say that a minstrel cannot be an artist, but he was enough of a figure in America to cause about half of the people in the country to say, "Well, I see old Al. G. Field is dead." Any man who can entertain, in person and through his employes, the people of a country for thirty-five years is at least no minor personage.

For many years he was very much of an entertainer himself. For a long time he was the greater part of his shows; but as time went on and he became prosperous and enabled to engage good men to assist him, he took less and less of the stage. Then he formed the habit of appearing for only a few minutes during a performance; and finally he stopped "working" entirely.

But always he was a showman; he knew mighty well who was doing good work and who was letting down, who was getting laughs and who was tiring the audience. That was why he managed to keep his show going in fair weather and foul, in hard times and good. Moreover, he was an excellent man of business; unlike many men who are capable behind the footlights, either as actors or directors, he knew the front of the house intimately. A box-office statement was no mystery to him; he knew the capacity of pretty much every theatre in the United States, and when he played a house that wasn't sold out, he wanted to know why. That was another reason why he managed to keep his show going. Many are the good stories told in the business world about the cannyness of "Uncle Al." in this respect.

Toward the end of his life, however, though he kept sharp watch on his show property, he didn't want to talk about it. He was a back-to-the-hand enthusiast, a farmer and a cattle-raiser, and it is said that the highest mark of favor he could show to one of his "boys", as he called the members of his troupe, was to invite him to spend a few days on his farm. A good showman, a good business-man, he managed to make a huge public laugh for thirty-five years. And that isn't a thing devoid of worth.
