## MARKET REPORT

(By Associated Press.)  
Cotton Futures

New York, June 19. Cotton futures opened firm: July 22.30, Oct. 22.20, Dec. 22.05, Jan. 21.83, March 21.75.

There was heavy July buying in the cotton market at the opening today, at a new high record.

Liverpool showed new high strength and rains over the week-end in the cotton belt had their effect also in raising prices from 21 to 21 points, and active months soon showed a net advance of 45 to 48 points, with October selling at 22.45 and December 22.24.

### Wall Street

New York, June 19.—The week in the stock market began with a resumption of the recent irregular movement.

The notice served on the R. R. Labor Board of the intention of the union leaders to stand by the strike vote forestalled short selling.

Market letters from commission houses advised caution.

Mexican petroleum opened at a gain of 1 1/4 points.

Foreign exchange displayed renewed weakness, especially British, French and Dutch.
