MR. McADEN'S WILL.

Dr. McAden Executor, Trustee and Guardian, Without Bond, for an Estate Worth \$250,000.

The will of the late Rufus Y. McAden, disposing of an estate valued at \$250,000, was probated in the office of the clerk of the Superior Court yesterday. At the outset the will pays a tribute to the character of Dr. John H. McAden, brother to the deceased, in placing the whole estate in his hands without the requirement of any bond whatever.

The will is dated April 9th, 1888, and says: "Being of sound mind, I make this my last will and testament, hereby revoking all former wills: I nominate and appoint my brother, John H. McAden, executor of this will, trustee and guardian of my children, and as I have confidence in his honesty and ability, I direct that he shall not be required to give any bond for the discharge of his duty."

The will then directs the executor "to pay off all my debts, and in order that he may do so at once, I direct him to use so much of my life insurance money as may be necessary. I request my wife and children to consent to this arrangement, as I know they would not accept the money with my debts unpaid; and in addition to this, this arrangement insures to their benefit, as it protects my property from sacrifice, and they are amply protected by the property. Should any of my children refuse to comply with this reasonable request, they are hereby excluded from all rights and interests in my estate. My impression is my life insurance policy secures to my wife twenty thousand (\$20,000) dollars; if not so, my executor is hereby directed out of my estate to make it that amount. In addition to this, I give to my wife and her heirs one-eighth (1/8) interest in my entire estate, both real and personal. I also give to her the house at my cotton factory, known as the dwelling house, together with twenty acres surrounding same, during her natural life. Also, I give to her absolutely all my household and kitchen furniture, carriages and horses. All the residue of my estate I give to my brother, Dr. John H. McAden, in trust for my children, he to have entire control of the same, and he is authorized to sell and dispose of the same, or any part thereof, at such time and on such terms as to him may seem best. He shall also have authority to keep in possession and manage and operate all such property as long as he may deem it wise to do so. That he may distribute such portions of said property or income thereupon at such times as he may deem it prudent for the best interests of my estate and my children. In case that any of my children are dissipated and disposed to waste their property, they are to receive only a small annual income until they prove by their conduct and habits that they are worthy to receive more. The portions of my property due to my daughters shall be given to them in their own right, free from the debts and liabilities of their husbands, at such times as my executor may deem best. My executor may charge such commissions for his services as he may think just and right."

The will is witnessed by M. P. Pegram and Archibald Graham. In the application for letters testamentary, Dr. McAden certifies that the estate of the late Rufus Y. McAden, consisting of real estate, bonds, stocks and other property, is worth \$250,000. This will disposes of more property than that of any will ever recorded in this county.

Court at Concord.

The new Judge, Brown, is holding the Superior Court of Cabarrus at Concord this week. The term is for the trial of civil cases only. The case that excites the most interest is the suit brought by H. M. Barnhardt vs. John Fink, for \$5,000 damages for false prosecution. It is being heard today. Judge Montgomery and Mr. H. S. Poyner represent the prosecution.

Scrapped by the Pullman.

This paper some weeks ago told of the arrangement made by the Richmond & Danville road to discard the Pullman cars and run a line of sleepers of the Union Palace Car Company. It now looks like the arrangement has been broken up, for it is said that the Pullman Company has scooped all the other lines in the South. The News & Observer says that the Richmond & Danville's new cars were to have been put on on the 25th. The district office of the new company was to have been located at Greensboro and Capt. J. E. Kanter, recently of the Pullman company, was to be district superintendent. Mr. T. A. Montgomery left Raleigh a few days ago to be cashier in the office at Greensboro and nearly all Pullman conductors running on the R. & D. lines resigned and accepted positions with the new company. The new service, however, has not yet gone into operation. In the event that the report of the deal is confirmed, however, the opinion has been expressed by prominent railroad officials that the Union company in selling to the Pullman provided that the employees who resigned their positions in the Pullman company to take positions with the Union shall be retained in the service of the Pullman. We presume this will be the case.

Frank Mayo in "The Royal Guard."

Joe Howard, Jr., in speaking of Mr. Mayo in this play says: "Not to see Frank Mayo as d'Artagnan, the Gascon adventurer in the 'Royal Guard,' is to miss a grand dramatic treat. The Charleston and Atlanta papers speak very highly of Mr. Bell's show. A feature of the entertainment will be the distribution of gifts, which are on exhibition in front of the opera house today.

4. That these resolutions be spread upon the minutes of the Board and that a copy of the same be furnished the family of the deceased and be also published in the city papers.
