| the CONFEDERATE REUNION. <br> Memphis is Ready For the Annual Gathering of Dixie's Heroes on June 8, 9 and 10 . <br> Memphis, Te n., May 16.-An nouncement is made by the general executive committee that all will be in readiness for the Confederate renuien, which will meet in Memphis on June 8, 9 and 10 and all indications point to one of the most successful gatherings in the history of the organization. <br> All Confederate veterans, who desire free accommodations, will be cared for in a general manner. The general cummittee makes announcement that food, lodging and medical attendance will be provided for each aud every old soldier, who shall make his wants known. <br> Chairman W. R. The young man with his car carried Dr. T. E. McBrayer, wife and three children to Fallston, and passed Mr. Walker, who was plowing a mule near the road.
