GROWING CORN.

As all our readers know, corn is one of the most important, if not the most important crop, grown in this immediate part of the country.

The Boys Corn Clubs and many of the men of the county have engaged in the cultivation of corn on a scientific basis and in accordance with modern methods of culture as prescribed by the state and National Boards of Agriculture. The results of this work can be seen and judged at this particular season of the year, better than at any other time. The past season has not been very favorable for growing corn, yet where this work was done scientifically and in accordance with instructions of the Department of Agriculture, it has produced good results. We have talked with only a few farmers on the subject, but the few we have seen are enthused over the experiments they have made with the Demonstration acres. Mr. John V. Link who lives in town and owns a farm a few miles west of town tells us he is confident he will gather 120 bushels from the acre he cultivated as a demonstration acre and Mr. Ward Powell says he will do nearly as well with his. Then there are others over the county who have done equally as well. These demonstrations should be enough to convince the most skeptical that it pays to plant and cultivate the corn crop as well as all others, scientifically. When a man can cultivate one acre of land and gather 75 to 125 bushels of corn from it he is foolish to waste his strength and energy trying to cultivate 40 or 50 acres in the old way and not get as much grain. In this connection we are told that one man in the county, who calls himself a farmer, will not gather 50 bushels of corn off of his whole acreage of nearly fifty acres. If these facts will not make people think and amend their ways in farming, especially raising corn, we do not know what will. It would be time well spent for the farmers of the county to visit all the demonstration acres throughout the county and thus see for themselves, just what is being done by their progressive neighbors and get in line for better work before time to plant on their corn crop.

THE COUNTY FAIRS

The various county Fairs held throughout the state are a great source of help to the people and especially the farmer. They are educative always giving impetus to the efforts of the tillers of soil and always encourage competing exhibits of farm products, agricultural, live stock horticulture, etc. These fairs present from all sections the most approved processes, methods and ideas. Aside from these

benefits the fair usually pays as a financial investment. Counties all around us are holding these fairs and thousands of people will be brought together and benefited by them. We regret that Caldwell will not be among the counties holding these beneficial gatherings this fall. But let us all work together and try to inject enough enthusiasm into the good people of our county to have our "opening fair" next fall.

NEW ITEMS.

Fire destroyed four residences in Salisbury last Wednesday, entailing a loss of \$6000 to \$8000.

It is said that the Southern Railway has appropriated \$60,000 to build a new passenger station at Asheville.

The Independent Democrats of Tennessee have endorsed Governor Hooper, who is a Republican, for re-election.

The Gould interests are reported to be organizing a \$30,000,000 corporation to consolidate all Washington public utilities.

To provide more room for crowds at the Washington mall park, the Federal government has ordered condemnation and razing of buildings covering half a square.

Mr. Geo. N. Watts, of Durham, has been elected president of the board of directors of the Aglethorpe University, the proposed Presbyterian institution to be erected in Atlanta.

Charging failure to file reports, Federal officials in Brooklyn have brought suit against 47 corporations. Last year there were 153 similar cases, with penalties amounting to \$50,000.

Since the death of young Rand caused by the hazing at the University last week, information has come to light of the injury to a young man named Ferrell at Wake Forest recently by hazing. His tormentors called at his boarding house and took him out and put him through stunts that caused him to be laid up in the infirmary for several days.

Miss Josie Shuttle is dead as a result of picking a tiny bump on her face with a brass pin. About a week ago she stood before her mirror at her home at Double Shoals, six miles north of Shelby, and opened a little bottle. The brass pin poisoned her and she died Sunday night, about 8 o'clock. Blood poison got through her system and she suffered fearfully.

John M. Harrell, special agent for several of the large insurance companies at High Point, has disappeared, he has not been seen since the morning of Sept. 5th. Without a word to his wife, office employees, business or social friends, he just dropped out of sight. It is thought that his business was in good shape and no reason can be found for his peculiar disappearance.

Girl Has Slept For Three Weeks.

Brookline, Mass., Sept. 16. Apparently sleeping naturally, Miss Agnes Hea, a student in the Medford High school, has been unconscious for three weeks. A fit of hysteria brought on her mysterious malady. She went to sleep while visiting at a Maine summer resort and was brought unconscious to her home in Medford.

A week ago she was taken to a Brookline hospital where she is still sleeping. Her pulse is normal and she appears to be healthy.

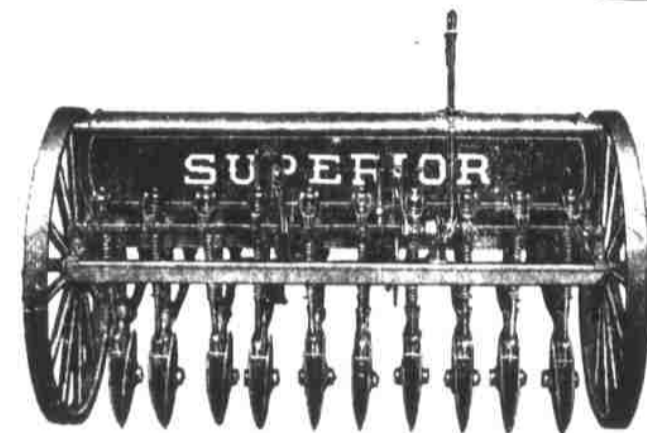
