NOTICE OF ELECTION

Be it ordained, by the board of aldermen of the town of Greenville, in a call meeting, on Friday night the 24th day of April, 1914, as is provided by the charter of said town and the various amendments thereto, as follows:

1. That an election be held in the several wards of said town, on Monday, the 1st day of June, 1914, for the purpose of electing five aldermen for said town. Those persons elected from the 2nd, 3rd and 4th wards of said town shall continue in office for two years from the first day of July, 1914, and those from the 1st and 5th wards for one year from July 1, 1914, or until their successors are duly elected and qualified. Aldermen to be elected from each of the five wards of said town as aforesaid:
2. That the following named persons are hereby appointed as registrars and judges of the election, to hold and conduct said election in the various wards of said town, to-wit: 1st ward, Chas. Cobb, registrar; J. B. White and J. I. Smith, judges of election. 2nd ward, M. H. White, registrar; L. W. Lawrence and B. F. Patrick, judges of election. 3rd ward, D. T. Beaman, registrar; J. S. Tunstall, J. F. Brinkley, judges of election. 4th ward, D. D. Haskett, registrar; James Brown and W. M. Moore, judges of election. 5th ward, J. G. Bowling, registrar; H. C. Edwards and H. L. Coward, judges of election.
3. That said election shall be held at the various places in said wards, to-wit: 1st ward, at court house. 2nd ward, at J. E. Winslows station. 3rd ward, J. S. Cockrell's office. 4th ward, at Munford's store. 5th ward, at J. F. King's stables.
4. That registration books of said town will be open at the various polling places in each ward on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, May 27, 28, and 29, from 9 o'clock, a. m., to five o'clock p. m. as is provided for by the charter of said town.

FINGER EXONERATES ALEXANDER AND TAKES THE BLAME OF MURDER.
SALISBURY, May 12.—Floyd Alexander, charged with implication in the murder of Preston Lyster at Barber February 24, is on trial here. The state rested its case this afternoon, after using practically the same evidence which convicted Sid Finger last week. The defense used Finger as a witness and he completely exonerated Alexander, taking the crime upon himself and telling in all the horrible details how he alone visited the store and killed and robbed Lyster and set the fire which destroyed his body.

Finger stuck to his awful story well under a severe cross examination by Dr. Clement, who is assisting Solicitor Clement.
