JAIL FOR RICH RASCALS.

The Attorney General of the United States has been directed by the President to bring a civil suit under the Sherman anti-trust law to dissolve the New Haven railroad system. The President has also ordered that the "criminal aspects of the case" be laid before a Federal grand jury. Those orders, following the Interstate Commerce Commission's report of the New Haven as "one of the most glaring instances of maladministration in all the history of American railroad," are highly significant. They mean that there is to be a new deal in railroad management and financing. They mean that henceforth it is going to be as dangerous to wreck a railroad as it is to wreck a bank. They mean that some men now living who have aided and abetted the wrecking of the New Haven may go to jail.

It is infinitely to the shame of past Administrations that the plundering of railroads has heretofore gone unpunished. It is infinitely to the credit of the present Administration that it regards the misappropriation of millions as entitling the embezzlers to no greater consideration than petty thieves are accustomed to receive at the hand of the law.

WILSON AND MEXICO

While the United States is not yet wholly "out of the woods" so far as the establishment of peace and orderly government in Mexico are concerned, the events to date have been a complete vindication of the wisdom and effectiveness of President Wilson's Mexican policy. With a hot-head or demagogue in the Presidential office at Washington, from which misfortune the election of Wilson instead of Roosevelt saved the country—the United States undoubtedly would be now engaged in a bitter and costly war with the Mexican people instead of occupying the position of friend and counsellor in their almost accomplished effort to restore constitutional government.

The resignation and flight of Huerta marked the inevitable collapse of the usurper's brief reign. It marked also the complete establishment of the new doctrine that usurpation is not to be recognized on this hemisphere. A constitutional government is to be established in Mexico. Peace at home and with the world, though they may not come to the long-suffering Mexicans at once, are at hand. Only incredible folly upon the part of the Constitutionalists, against which they have been impressively warned by our government, can long delay the restoration of peace.

That the world has been impressed with the great moral victory achieved by President Wilson's policy is evidenced by the comment of the European press on Huerta's downfall. On this hemisphere particularly, the invocation of mediation by American powers, as a means of arranging international differences in America, has immeasurably strengthened the confidence of Latin-America in the integrity of our purposes. The United States emerges from the trying incidents of the Mexican revolution with untarnished honor and vastly enhanced prestige, for which a nation's thanks are due their cool-headed, conscientious President.

In mentioning Greenville's present building progress, Saturday, the number of handsome residences being added to the town were for the time overlooked. But they speak for themselves on nearly every street.

The Railroad Employees Department of the American Federation of Labor has started out to gather data for the greatest hard-luck story ever written. DR. H. W. CARTER ON THE HOSPITAL QUESTION

Dr. H. W. Carter, Washington, N. C. has a letter in today's issue favoring a County Hospital.

Dr. Carter is a Specialist on diseases of the eye, ear, nose and throat. For two years he has spent one day in each week in Greenville practicing his specialty. He has removed adenoids from a great many of Pitt County's children, especially those in the town of Greenville. The country child is practically deprived of what services could be given him because there is no place at home that can take care of him while having his ears, nose and throat treated. IS THIS FAIR TO THE COUNTRY CHILD?

The ill effects of eye strain, deafness, adenoids and enlarged tonsils has come to be such common knowledge among all classes of people that to discuss it in detail would be no much less than a reflection on our county's intelligence. We all know how it clogs the child's capacity to learn. How to get these diseases corrected is the problem? It can be solved in no way than a COUNTY HOSPITAL for there EVERY CHILD has equal rights—the country child, the town child, the poor child and the rich child all fair alike and if there they can get these defects remedied.

If the child has such an inalienable right to education that we make education compulsory, has he not an equal right to a place where he can get medical and surgical aid that will put him in position to receive that education which we are forcing on him? If a County Hospital did nothing correct the physician defects that prevent the child from receiving an education, this in itself would be an investment that would pay more than legal interest on many millions of dollars.

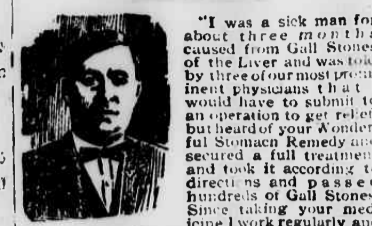
