An Average For the Season of \$19.45 Per Hundred Pounds. Few Markets of State Can Equal this Average.

One of the leading annual events of the year, that is looked forward to with more interest than anything else that occurs among our people but once a year, is the opening of the Greenville tobacco market. A time that is longed for by the growers of the weed and the business constituents as well. Not only is this applicable to the farmers and business men of this immediate section, but throughout the county hearts are made glad, when in so many instances the farmer can rid his mind of that little note here or there that he is expected to take up at tobacco marketing time. And just think of the other fellow, that piece of paper, in these many months, making his plans where he shall use the cash.

On account of the drought of the early summer the tobacco stands are not as good as last year, but now a better harvest is expected than was even a month ago. The weed this year will fall short in body and weight compared with that of last season. This is due to the bad stand made in the beginning.

Last year there was sold on Greenville market 15,151,293 pounds which was very well divided among the seven warehouses. The sum paid for this tobacco was \$2,951,298.60, which made an average for the year of \$19.45 per hundred pounds. That average was equalled by few if any of the markets of the state.

The South Carolina market opened last week, and like last year big prices prevailed from the very start. This very likely means that the farmers of North Carolina may expect good prices in the beginning, and if the market holds its own, as it did last year, they will continue through the entire season.

The warehousemen all report that they are ready for the big opening that is expected on August 18th.

Never before has this market been as well prepared to take care of the weed as it is this year, with additional buyers and the many additions made

to the factories that will enable the buyers to take care of every pile they can buy. The largest improvements made during the year was that of the Export Leaf Tobacco Company; they having erected two large buildings that will enable their local buyers here to supply the enormous demands made of them each year.

The warehousemen report they are expecting the best year since the first leaf of tobacco was marketed in Greenville, for the main reason that the market is becoming more and more popular each year, each season bringing growers here from the adjoining counties that had marketed their crops elsewhere.

OF TYPHOID-PNEUMONIA MR. W. S. WILSON DIES

After an illness about ten days of typhoid-pneumonia Mr. W. S. Wilson who lives about a mile south of Greenville died Tuesday about 12 o'clock in his forty-second year of age. He is survived by a wife and seven children, and was a member of the order of Red Men and Modern Woodmen of America.

The interment took place Wednesday afternoon near Ayden at the family burying ground.

suggested a recess until 3 o'clock p. m., whereupon others ventured a few remarks and upon motion it was agreed to recess as stated above.

There after an hour's possible wait with a speech or two sanctioned in the meantime the platform committee announced its readiness to report its findings. Heretofore it was stated by the chairman of the committee, the platform of "resolves and principles" had been prepared in advance, but this time it was not. Hence the unusual delay (For lack of space the platform of principles is not incorporated herewith) however, the long delay gave the Senator another opportunity to advance a few observations. He told about the invisible government and the mighty efforts the opposition were making to defeat him in the coming Primary. He told us about a secret meeting of some of the high cock-o-loriums in a certain lawyers office in this town last week, in which the statement was made as he was reliably informed that "Bill Evans had to be beat," if they had to steal the election." Whereupon he warned his friends to be vigilant in and out of a season—and there is no doubt that they are determined to watch the ropes.

After the reading of the platform and its adoptions in toto, the convention betook itself to the task of endorsing certain candidates to be voted on at the coming primary. Here they are: For the Senate: W. F. Evans, For the House: U. S. Jackson, on South side of river, the North side being left open until a suitable candidate could be found. For County Commissioners they adjudged R. L. Worthington, R. L. Joyner, J. B. Hardee, and S. A. Congleton good material.

There were no other candidates given the o. k. At this point the little Leader suggested that they go into executive session. Whereupon they made a break for the jury room thus depriving the writer of anything further to observe, so he left, as many others had done before.
