PRESIDENT POINCARE MAKES PROTEST.

BORDEAUX, Sept. 21—President Poincare directed a formal protest to neutral nations against the destruction of cathedral ruins by German artillery. The protest declares that the German troops for sole pleasure and without the slightest necessity wrought this destruction at Rheims through systematic bombardment. The French government denounces the action as a revolting act of vandalism which should arouse the indignation of the world. The first news of the French naval forces has been made public, French commerce is unrestricted and the French navy is rendering important service in co-operation with the British fleets in the Mediterranean and North seas. Fleets are blockading German and Austrian coasts. French are sure ultimate success if the war is prolonged.

ALLIES LOSS OF MEN GREAT

LONDON, Sept. 21—Anxiety is increasing here as the battle in north France continues without the Allies being able to gain any appreciable advantage. The strength of the German position is now realized. It is admitted that every advantage gained by the British is at terrible cost with the realization that the casualty list of the Allies will be staggering. The war office declares the situation is favorable though no decisive results have as yet been reported.

BOMBARDMENT OF RHEIMS NECESSARY.

BERLIN, Sept. 21—The bombardment of Rheims was declared by the General staff necessary because the heaviest fire from the French came from that direction. The war office announces that Tremont was taken by assault, the Allies holding the position were driven back with heavy losses.

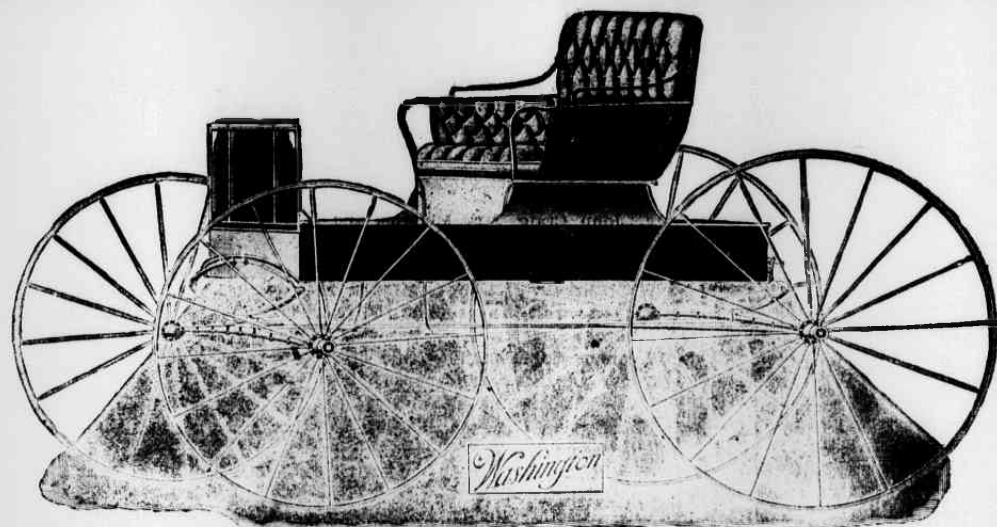

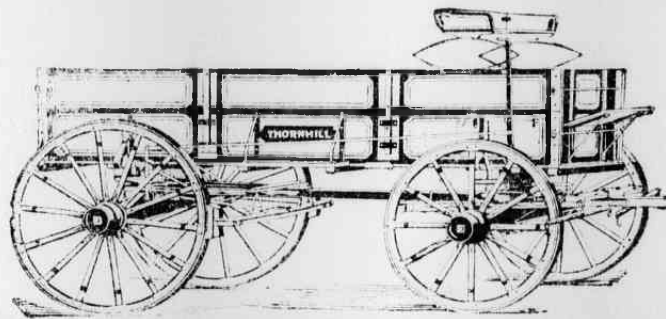

ALLIES LINES HOLD.

PARIS, Sept. 21—It is officially stated that the French left rushed forward in an effort to outflank the army Gen. Von Kluck. The Germans rushed the center in a desperate effort to pierce the lines of the Allies fortifications. Craonne on the Allies left center has been silenced. As the engagement progressed the Germans fought with desperation making many bayonet charges but the Allies held their position at all points.

RUSSIANS BESIEGING PRZEMYSL.

PETROGRAD, Sept. 21—The war office announces further advances by the Russian army which made fierce attacks with overwhelming forces on Dubiecko on the river San. The Russians captured thousands of prisoners with large supplies when this city fell. Przemysl is now under attack from three different directions. The bombardment is proving effective and the forces are advancing upon the outer fortifications. In Etruzze the Montenegrin army has occupied the town of Rogikza in Bosnia and are now within 10 miles of Sarajevo, capital of the province, which is certain to be captured.

TERRIBLE SLAUGHTER AND DESTRUCTION.

PARIS, Sept. 21—The battle of Aisne will be unprecedented in history for slaughter and destruction without advantage on either side. The bombardment of Rheims continues. Heavy guns on the hills three miles away are levelling buildings. It is admitted that the German artillery fire is deadly accurate, some of the heaviest German guns shelling the lines of the Allies are seven miles distant. All German artillery is handled with remarkable cleverness. The French admitted one of heaviest guns doing the most damage cannot be located by their forces.

EVACUATION OF JAROSLAW EXPLAINED.

VIENNA, Sept. 21—The evacuation of Jaroslau by the Austrians was accomplished because they desired to concentrate their forces for the defense of Przemysl according to the war office. Jaroslau was fired after the Austrians forces left the city.
