

TOBACCO SALES THIS YEAR NEARLY EQUAL TO LAST

Year's Sales, Being Only About
300,000 Pounds Less to
Date

GOOD SALES FOR LAST WEEK

Prices Are Satisfactory And Farmers
Are Well Pleas'd With Conditions
of The Market—Much Tobacco
to Be Sold Yet.

The tobacco sales on this market this fall have been exceedingly good. In fact present indications are that a great deal more tobacco will be sold here this year than has ever been sold before. While the number of pounds sold each day is not as high as it was some time ago the sales are regular and on one or two occasions last week the sale required almost the full hours to finish. There is a good deal of tobacco yet to be sold and it is expected that heavy sales will continue for some time. When it is all over and the final figures are given out this market is going to compare favorably with the highest seasons.

The prices during this season have been very satisfactory indeed. The war has affected almost all prices but in spite of that fact tobacco has been bringing about all that could be expected considering the grade and there has been general satisfaction with prices received.

The total amount of tobacco sold on this market this fall amounts to 11,655,924 pounds. Compared with the total sale for the last year which was 14,959,913 pounds this year's sales up to last Friday are only 304,889 pounds behind the total sales for last year. With the tobacco that remains yet to be sold it is certain to run this year's figures much higher. The total sale for last week was 1,213,529 pounds these figures are only about 500,000 pounds behind some of the highest week's sales registered this year.

On the whole this has been a very good year for the tobacco grower. He has not suffered as other crop farmers has but has had a good market the entire season.

Pollard Jury Have Been Unable to Agree on Ver- dict at Last Reports

The jurors who were selected for the Pollard trial have been trying to reach a decision since Saturday night when the case was given to them. Now after nearly forty-eight hours they are still hung up. It is rumored that they stand 10 to 2 in favor of acquittal and have stood this way since early yesterday.

After having been out this long without an agreement there is little chance of an agreement. The jurors have been ordered to agree if possible and they will be held until all hope of an agreement is past before being turned loose.

This is the second trial and on the former trial the jury was out for about four hours before bringing in a verdict of guilty.

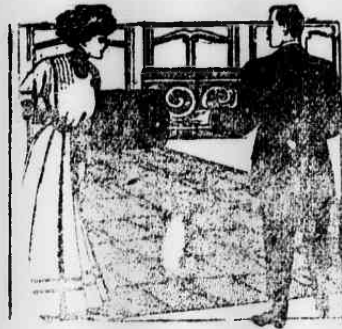

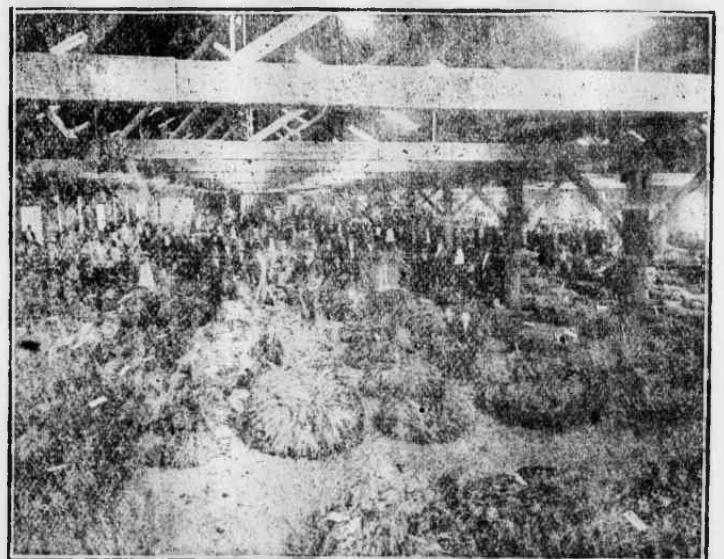
