One of the best things the railroads are doing for the country through which they pass is to encourage farmers to locate on the right of way. The railroads have found that this means more money for them as well as for the farmer.

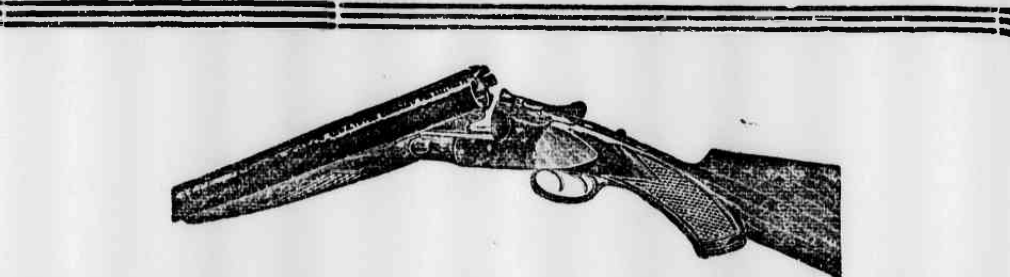

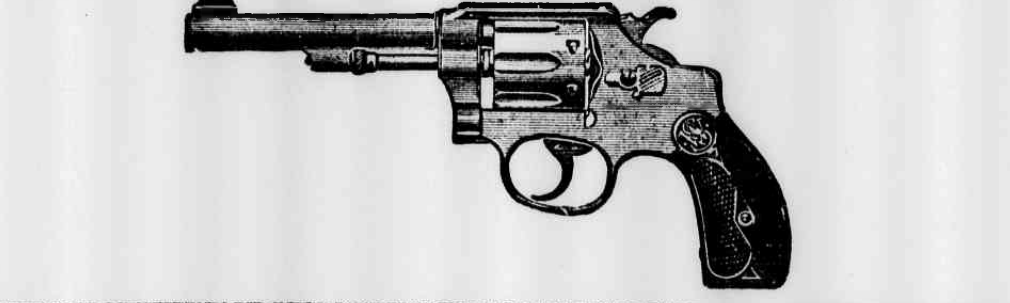

WALL STREET BACK IN OLD TIME FORM ON HOPE OF PEACE

New York, March 25.—Dealings in securities on the stock exchange today were heavier and on a larger scale than at any time since the resumption of business last December. Total transactions approximated \$2,000,000,000 and the average of prices was highest for the current year, but somewhat under the best quotations of last December.

United States steel led with an aggressive sale of almost 1,000,000 shares. Many large blocks of 100,000 to 200,000 shares changed hands on the rise of two-quarter points. Reading came at with a gain of 2 1/8 on a total output of 1,000 shares, it bowed by Green Pacific and Amalgamated Copper, each of which was traded in to the extent of 1,000 shares and gained 1 3/8 and 2 3/4 points respectively.

Dealings in these four leaders composed about 40 per cent of the day's operations, which embraced business of active trading followed advice from Europe which suggested an early termination of the war. Other favorable factors included further large gold imports and signs of greater improvement in the country's domestic and foreign commerce.

A larger percentage of the day's business was traceable to speculative demand and short covering. Investment inquiry continues to show extreme caution, as denoted by the bond market, which failed to keep pace with the day's movement in stocks.

Slayer of Policeman Convicted

Wilmington, Del., March 23.—Peter Krakas, alias Melba, today was convicted of first degree murder for killing Francis X. Tierney, a policeman, on March 6.

Krakas, according to an alleged confession by an accomplice, murdered the Rev. Joseph Zebais, priest of the Lithuanian Church, and his housekeeper at New Britain, Conn., on February 8, and fled with the accomplice to this city. When Tierney pursued the two men Krakas killed him with a revolver shot.

Jersey Church Conference
